Can you believe the year is almost half over? And our United Methodist Women's year is half order. Unit Treasurers have sent their 2nd quarter reports and checks to me. Thank you to each Treasurer for your dedication to United Methodist Women.

Blue Ridge District United Methodist Women thank you for your mission giving in 2016. The contribution of each unit is extremely important in supporting UMW efforts around the world on behalf of women, children, and youth.

Our total amount sent to District Treasurer for half of this year is <u>\$43,466.74</u>. Undesignated giving totaled <u>\$31,564.83</u>, which is applied to our yearly pledge to mission of \$79,000. As you can see, we are not half way to our pledge goal with half the year behind us. I am sure all units are working to make sure we again reach all our goals for UMW mission giving.

I am very proud to congratulate you for contributing <u>\$4,865.78</u> to the Legacy Fund in the first half of 2016. Western North Carolina Conference United Methodist Women led the nation in Legacy Fund contributions in 2015. A large part of that recognition is due to the prayers and contributions of Blue Ridge District United Methodist Women. Let's keep up the good work.

Many of our units may be small in the number of members, but we are all big in heart and in working for United Methodist Women. I am very proud to be serving you as District Treasurer. Having finished our district mission study, we are gearing up for Mission u at Pfeiffer College on July 21-24, 2016. The social issues study will be climate justice, and the study book is entitled Climate Justice: A Call to Hope and Action by Pat Watkins. The spiritual growth study will focus on The Bible and Human Sexuality by Ellen Brubaker. The geographical study will again be on Latin America (Latin America: People and Faith by Sonia Maria Barbosa Dias). All study books are available at www.umwmissionresources.org or (800) 305-9857. Mission u is a very valuable spiritual and educational experience. It's well worth the time.

Our district mission study was excellent, as your evaluations indicated. You gave Dixie Liggett high marks for her leadership and especially appreciated the wide variety of learning activities. We learned so much about our neighbors and their needs and realized how many problems we share. We are more alike than different. Black Mountain UMC was an excellent venue and Black Mountain UMW were excellent hostesses. They provided a wonderful lunch. Fifty ladies attended.

We've done really well with our hands on mission projects. At the Spiritual Growth Retreat, I turned in 262 health kits (value \$3144.00), 2 sewing kits (value \$56.00), 1 school kit (value \$11.00), and 4 layette kits (value \$180.00), and \$564.00 for mailing/toothpaste for a total of \$3955.00. Our hands on project for the mission study was a financial gift for the Good Neighbor Settlement House in Brownsville, Texas (chosen because the group works so effectively with Latinos in the area). We collected \$727.00! Of course, the money we spend is eclipsed by the lives we touch. Each kit touches someone who is vulnerable and often in desperate circumstances. We pray that each person who receives a kit knows that some UMW woman somewhere has reached out in love. See you at Mission u!

Together we can accomplish so much.



Program Resources

Last October I joined 23 other United Methodist Women of the Blue Ridge District in a two-state bus tour of the Civil Rights Movement in America. As we traveled through Georgia, Alabama, and back again, I heard horrific stories I had not heard before, I learned of unsung heroes I had never known about, and I was disturbed to realize that the struggle for equal rights and equal opportunities for all persons--regardless of their skin color—still continues today.

By the grace of God I'm convinced— several of us returned home to find that our book club's next read was the book <u>Just Mercy</u>: A <u>Story of Justice and Redemption</u>, by Bryan Stevenson, <u>and</u> the title is one of the bonus books on our UMW Reading Program list for 2016. Coincidence? I don't think so. I <u>needed</u> to read this book. And if I may be so bold as to say so: you need to read it too, if you haven't already.



Just Mercy, published in 2014, is the unforgettable story of Bryan Stevenson, a gifted young black attorney in the South who was determined to bring justice and defense to those most desperately in need of it: the poor, the wrongly accused, and women and youth trapped in the black holes of our criminal justice system. Through him we witness first hand the system's abuses of the marginalized people he defends. Bryan Stevenson's fervor never waivers in his argument for compassion and mercy within a very corrupt system, a system which proves time and time again that it's better to be rich and guilty than to be poor and innocent.



Trying a 10-year-old child as an adult? A child who, under pressure from his gang-member peers, is guilty of a crime he was forced to commit? Yes, the system treats him as an adult. Learn about other atrocities such as a prosecutor's indifference to innocence if it won't win his case. Corporations that conspire to convince lawmakers and politicians to make up new crimes so that prison populations will increase, and contracts can be granted to build new prisons. Atrocious indeed, but unfortunately these are just a few examples of a very broken system that Stevenson describes.

I was appalled and outraged. You will be too, when you read this book. It will forever change your view of how "justice" is carried out within our country's legal system. It will also inspire you to learn of one young attorney's tireless pursuit to extend compassion and mercy when it is right, good, and *just*.

And as a United Methodist Woman, it will make you even more determined to work to correct the wrongs which continue to be committed against the "least of these" children of God.

Charlie Gibson's Enchilada Casserole (This was served at Mission Study in Black Mtn.)

Ingredients:

1 package Doritos (13-ounce), save 2 cups for casserole topping

2 tbsp. onion, grated

1 10-ounce can chili with beans

10 to 15 ounce enchilada sauce

1 can tomato sauce (8 ounce)

1 1/2 cups shredded sharp cheddar cheese

Topping

2 cups Doritos

1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1 1/4 cups sour cream

Cooking Directions:

- Preheat oven to 375° F.
- Crumble 6 cups Doritos with your hands into a large mixing bowl.
- Add the onion, the chili, the enchilada sauce, tomato sauce and 1½ cups of cheddar cheese to the crumbled Doritos. Stir with a rubber spatula to combine. Place mixture into an 8½ x 11-inch oven proof casserole dish. Bake for 20 minutes.
- Remove from the oven. Spread the sour cream over the top of the casserole with a large spoon or rubber spatula. Top with remaining 2 cups Doritos. Then sprinkle with the 1/2 cup of the cheddar cheese.
- Bake for another five minutes and serve.

School Kit

Value: \$11.00

1 pair blunt scissors: rounded tip only no plastic scissors, please

3 pads of paper: spiral- or top-bound pads 150 sheets or less of loose leaf can be substituted for one pad combination of spiral, top bound, side bound or loose leaf is acceptable no composition books, please

1 hand-held pencil sharpener: must be at least one-inch long remove from packaging

1 30-centimeter ruler: hard or flexible cartoon characters are acceptable no advertisements, please

6 unsharpened pencils: no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols, please cartoon characters are acceptable

1 2-inch or larger size eraser: no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols, please cartoon characters are acceptable

1 24-count box of crayons: only 24-count boxes please

1 14"x16" cloth bag: homemade or purchased bags are both acceptable heavy-duty fabric only – denim, corduroy, drapery fabric, etc. no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols, please closures are optional but must be buttons, snaps or Velcro sewn in middle of opening, if used (See the next page for instructions for making the bag)

Assembly directions

Place all loose items on top of paper. Turn items sideways and slide into the cloth bag. Fold over the top of the bag so loose items don't fall out.

Important notes

- (See pattern for the bag on next page)
- All items must be new.
- All emergency kits are carefully planned to make them usable in the greatest number of situations. Since strict rules often govern product entry into international countries, it is important that kits contain only the requested items nothing more.
- DO NOT include any personal notes, money or additional material in the kits. These things must be painstakingly removed and will delay the shipment.

Please enclose an envelope containing at least \$1 for each kit you send.

This donation enables kits to be sent to areas in need.





Make the Bag

USE HEAVY DUTY FABRIC (not lightweight).

Cut 2 pieces of cloth 15" x 19" allowing 1/2" for seams on sides and bottom and 2 1/2" hem at the top. This will give the required finished size 14" x 16".

Place the two 15" x 19" pieces of cloth together, right sides together, and sew a 1/2" seam down one side across the bottom and up the other side, leaving the top open.

Turn the bag so the seam is inside the bag.

Turn under 1/2" of the top edge and stitch.

Turn under 2" at the top to form a hem and stitch.

Make the Handles

For handles cut 2 pieces 4" x 23".

Fold in half the length of one of the 4" x 23" pieces with right sides together.

Stitch with a 1/2" seam allowance and turn the seam to the inside.

Repeat with the second piece of cloth.

Place one handle at the top of the bag, turning under 1/2" raw edge of the material and secure by stitching. Repeat with the other piece of cloth making the handle on the opposite side of the bag.

Optional Closure

Closures are optional and may be done with buttons, snaps or Velcro. When using Velcro, stitch small pieces of Velcro near the top center inside of the bag, Velcro loops on one side, Velcro hooks on the other.

The purpose of promoting a Mission Today Unit is to:

Energize United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action. Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes. Encourage the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a Unit?

A unit is any organized group of United Methodist Women within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles, which periodically get together for a unit meeting.

How Do We Become a Mission Today Unit?

In order to be recognized as a Mission Today Unit, UMW groups must complete a minimum of twelve of the following criteria, including six of those marked with an asterisk (*). #1 of the Criteria is not optional. You must complete this one to become a Mission Today Unit! Activities conducted between January 1-December 31, 2015, will be recognized at annual meetings in 2016. This is an ongoing program, so strive to become a Mission Today Unit!

Criteria for a Mission Today Unit:

- *1. The Unit will make and meet its Pledge to Mission. (Must be completed)
- *2. Use the <u>Prayer Calendar</u> at each general meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth.
- *3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year.
- *4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit, other than a conference or district officer, attend MISSION U or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study...Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)
- *5. The unit will have at least two members <u>subscribing</u> to <u>response</u>. (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members.)
- *6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year.
- *7. Become a member of the Western North Carolina UMW Justice Today.
- *8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll.
- *9. The unit will have one program from the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2013-2016.
- 10. At least one member of the unit (other than a conference or a district officer) will attend <u>MISSION U</u> (formerly School of Christian Mission) and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced.
- 11. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members), other than a conference or district officer, will attend the district or <u>conference annual meeting</u> and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced.
- 12. The unit will have at least one person joining the <u>United Methodist Women's Action Network</u> to receive and respond to legislative information at least three (3) times a year. (To join, contact Women's Division Washington Office, 100 Maryland Ave. NE, Suite 530, Washington, DC 20002). (Attach to Mission Today report what you responded to and what action was taken.)
- 13. Members will correspond with five persons listed in the Prayer Calendar at least once a year.
- 14. The unit will co-sponsor, with the local church, a <u>Children's Sabbath</u>. (This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children.) The United Methodist Women National Office and the Council of Bishops support this effort. Contact <u>Children's Defense Fund</u> for materials at 25 E. St. NW, Washington, DC 20001. Telephone 202-628-8787.
- 15. The unit will contribute to all <u>five channels of Mission Giving</u>. (See page 10)
- 16. Each unit or circle meeting will include a "Response Moment" where an item from <u>response</u> magazine will be lifted up as a way to tell the mission story.
- 17. The unit will sponsor one teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one Conference event during the year.
- 18. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members), other than a conference or district officer, will attend a district Prayer Breakfast, district Day Apart or conference Spiritual Growth Retreat.
- 19. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) other than a district or conference officer will complete Plan 1 of the Reading Program and give a report to the unit on one of the books read.
- 20. The unit will invite a district or conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings during the year and/or for their United Methodist Women's Sunday.
- 21. The unit will add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young women (ages 18-39) circle during the year, or one new teen member (ages 12-17) or one new young woman member (ages 18-39) during the year.
- 22. The unit will be responsible for supporting at least one local mission project and participate in one Conference Hands On Mission Project during the year. The local project should be listed on your Mission Today report.

What is The Legacy Fund?

What is the purpose of The Legacy Fund?
