Secretary:

I have to echo Lorraine's comment of what a wonderful District annual meeting and celebration we had on August 25th. Katie Burns gave an inspiring talk and we celebrated the 2017 successes of our Appalachian District UMW units. We celebrated 18 Mission Today units; 12 units that participated in at least one Mission study; 12 units with at least one new member; 17 Justice Today units (6 - Gold; 6 - Silver; and 5 - Bronze); 27 units giving in all 5 channels of mission giving; and 13 units who had at least one person participating in the reading program (total participants included 25 Plan I readers, 10 Plan II readers, 5 Plan III readers, 5 Plan IV readers, and 3 Child/Youth readers for a total of 47 participating readers). Additionally, our District Units honored 107 people with gifts in memory; our district team and units presented gifts to mission honoring 189 people/groups; and we honored 46 individuals with special mission recognition. We recognized three outgoing district officers (Kimberly Smith – Nominations Chair; Sara Reid – Nominations committee, 2018; and Belinda Johnson – Nominations committee, 2018), elected four nominations committee members for the class of 2020 – welcome and thank you for your willingness to serve to Kimberly Witherspoon, Judy Sipe, Penny Ledbetter, and Terri Williams; and confirmed the four new electees and remaining 2018 District Officers to make up our 2019 slate of Appalachian District Officers. Keep up the good work Appalachian District UMW!



From your Appalachian District Legacy Fund Energizer

Good news from the National Office regarding the Legacy Fund balance as of June 30, 2018. The giving total is over \$21 million. The planned giving amount is \$3 million. Added together, the amount is now over \$24 million. For our WNCC, the total is almost \$214,000. Hooray!!

Here I am again to write to you about the Legacy Fund. You could say that I am like a weed in your flower garden. Maybe a small one that looks deceptively easy to pluck, but, with 149 years of legacy behind me, I have very long roots that hold fast in the dirt.

I can provide a great speaker for National Native American Heritage Month. Let me know if you are interested. Here is a little about her:

Fawn Roark has been active in missions to Native American Indian Reservations since around 2002 since traveling to Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, located in one of the poorest counties in America. After Fawn read an article about poverty and challenges facing those living on the reservation, she decided she had to go see for herself if it was true. That first trip she took along with her older sister, Beth, was the first of over 20 to different reservations for a variety of outreaches. From feeding the homeless to unloading tractor trailers for Christmas distribution to helping with outreaches on the basketball courts, she says she has fallen in love with the people she has been able to serve and work alongside of. She is passionate about sharing the stories of hope from the trips along with the challenges that many face the Native Americans right here in America that often rival life in a third world country. Her favorite place to travel is Pine Ridge Indian Reservation where the average annual income is less than \$6,000 and life expectancy is 48 for men and 52 for women. She speaks at churches, ladies and youth groups, community organizations, schools and anywhere she can to help others hopefully find their passion in helping others near and far.


Program Resources:

Mission Today 2018 United Methodist Women Western North Carolina Conference

MAKE A DIFFERENCE! Become a Mission Today Unit!!

The purpose of promoting a Mission Today Unit is to:

Energize United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action. Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes. Encourage the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a Unit?

A unit is any organized group of United Methodist Women within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles, which periodically get together for a unit meeting.

How Do We Become a Mission Today Unit?

In order to be recognized as a Mission Today Unit, UMW groups must complete a minimum of twelve of the following criteria, including seven of those marked with an asterisk (*). **#1 of the Criteria is not optional. You must complete this one to become a Mission Today Unit!** Activities conducted between January 1-December 31, 2018, will be recognized at annual meetings in 2019.

This is an ongoing program, so strive to become a Mission Today Unit!

CRITERIA:

*1. The Unit will make and meet its Pledge to Mission. (Must be completed.)

- *2. The unit will use the Prayer Calendar at each general meeting or circle meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth. A new Prayer Calendar is printed each year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- *3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year. A new Program Book is printed every year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- *4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit attend the conference Mission u or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study, Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)
- *5. The unit will have at least two members subscribing to **response** (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members; Local unit subscription may count as one.) Order information is printed at bottom of page 2. \$24.00 for a one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription); \$20 for a one-year digital only subscription.
- *6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. Possibilities are:
 - a. Have members read and discuss books and articles about other races and cultures;
 - b. Sponsor or attend an interethnic event between two or more units;
 - c. Intentionally recruit women of other ethnic groups to be members and officers of the unit;
 - d. Use the "Resources for Racial Justice: Tools for UMW Leaders" handbook. (Available on our conference website on the "Downloads Available" page, and on the "Mission Today" page.)
 - e. Write to elected representatives to support legislation affecting issues such as immigration, affirmative action, low-income programs, civil rights, etc.
- *7. The unit will become a member of the Western North Carolina UMW Justice Today. See link to info on Justice Today at our conference website, www.wnccumw.org/social-action. Scroll down to "Justice Today 2017."
- *8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll.

- *9. The unit will have one program from the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2017-2020.
- *10. The unit will contribute to all Five Channels of Mission Giving.
- *11. The UMW Purpose will be recited at each general and/or circle meeting.
- *12. The unit will contribute \$186.90 or more to the Legacy Fund.
- At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on classes and events they
 experienced.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend the district or conference annual meeting and report back to the unit about the event and what they experienced.
- 15. The unit will have at least one person joining the United Methodist Women's Action Network to receive and respond to legislative information at least three (3) times a year. (To join, contact the United Methodist Women Washington Office, 100 Maryland Avenue NE, Room 100, Washington, DC 20002. Phone #: 202-488-5660. Email: csad@unitedmethodistwomen.com (Attach to Mission Today report the action that was taken and to which issue.)
- 16. Members will correspond with five persons listed in the Prayer Calendar at least once a year.
- 17. The unit will co-sponsor, with the local church, a Children's Sabbath. (This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children.) The United Methodist Women National Office and the Council of Bishops support this effort. Children's Sabbath materials are on our website.
- 18. Each unit or circle meeting will include a "*response* Moment" where an item from *response* magazine will be lifted up as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. The unit will sponsor one teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one conference event during the year.
- At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend a district Prayer Breakfast, district Day Apart, conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special district or conference event other than Ubuntu Day.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will participate in an Ubuntu Day Event.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will complete Plan 1 of the Reading Program and give a report to the unit on one of the books read.
- 23. The unit will invite a district or conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings during the year and/or for their United Methodist Women's Sunday. This Qualifies as a Local Unit Visit (LUV).
- 24. The unit will add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18 to 39) circle during the year, or one new teen member (ages 12 to 17) or one new young woman member (ages 18 to 39) during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund
- 26. The unit will accomplish the Conference Financial Goal for 2018: To Increase Membership by 5%.
- 27. Each unit will be responsible for supporting at least one local mission project and participate in one Conference Hands-on Mission Project during the year. The local project should be listed on your Mission Today report.

Theme: Developing Sacred Spaces

Hands on Mission: UMCOR School Kits (see new material and kit instructions below)

Kit Materials: One pair blunt scissors (round-tip only; no plastic scissors); one box of 24 crayons (only 24-count boxes are accepted); three one-subject notebooks (no marble composition books; no 3 or 5-subject notebooks); one pack of loose-leaf paper (100-200 page packers are acceptable; wide or college rule accepted); one hand-held pencil sharpener (1-inch or longer; remove from packaging); one ruler (12 inches or 30 centimeters long; sturdy or flexible material accepted); six unsharpened pencils; one eraser (two inches or larger); one two-gallon re-sealable plastic bag

 Assembly Directions: stack all paper items on top of each other: Place all loose items on top of paper. (Small loose items may be placed in a smaller re-sealable bag.); Place kit inside of re-sealable bag and seal.

NOTE: Cloth tote bags are no longer being accepted; all items must be new; please do not include any personal notes, money or additional materials in the kits; Contents or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols; please include a check or cash for \$1 per kit to cover shipping costs in a separate envelope. Directions:

From Boone and West

Take US 421 South to exit 265A (approx. 52mi) and take ramp right for I-77N toward Elkin; take exit 83 (left ramp) to US-21 bypass toward Roaring Gap/Sparta; take exit ramp for NC-268 bypass toward Elkin and take a left onto 268. In .9 miles, turn left on US-21BR (Bridge Street); in 1 mile, turn left onto Hawthorne Rd; in approx .5 miles, arrive at First UMC Elkin.

From Sparta and North

Take US-21 toward NC-18 (approx. 25 miles); keep straight onto US-21S bypass/US 21 and keep right onto Bridge Street; in approx 2.5 miles, turn left onto Hawthorn Rd; in .5 miles, arrive at First UMC Elkin.

From Statesville and South

Take I-77N toward Elkin; take exit 83 (left ramp) to US-21 bypass toward Roaring Gap/Sparta; take exit ramp for NC-268 bypass toward Elkin and take a left onto 268. In .9 miles, turn left on US-21BR (Bridge Street); in 1 mile, turn left onto Hawthorne Rd; in approx .5 miles, arrive at First UMC Elkin.

Happy 150th Anniversary! Let's Celebrate!

In just a matter of months, we will celebrate together our 150th year as women organized for mission. In the midst of this busy fall season of conference, district, and unit events and leadership meetings, we don't want to lose sight of the biggest celebration of all!

We're fast approaching our anniversary year of 2019. How will you celebrate? With whom will you share the story of United Methodist Women in these upcoming months? If you don't already have your celebrations planned, let us offer a few 150th suggestions for you:

- March 23, 2019, our actual 150th anniversary date, is a Saturday, so consider organizing a celebration of United Methodist Women that lasts for that entire weekend (March 22-24). Activities might include, on Friday: a service day, a unit program. On Saturday: a 150th birthday party or special event, a women's slumber party, a retreat, a service day, participation in the Day of Giving (March 23). On Sunday: a worship service planned and conducted by United Methodist Women, a festive luncheon, a prayer service.
- Plan a Fun-Raiser and announce the amount raised at a 150th birthday party over the March 23 weekend. What is a "Fun-Raiser"? It is an activity your unit, circle, or conference creates to raise money for the Legacy Fund Endowment Campaign. Details about how to Fun-Raise for the Legacy Fund can be found at the Legacy Fund website: unitedmethodistwomen.org/150.
- Remind your members that because every woman needs to have a valid will, everyone can easily plan for a gift of any size to United Methodist Women in her will. Could we get 150 bequest commitments from each conference in our anniversary year?

- Promote the legacy of your United Methodist Women community and global work by sending a story to your local newspaper or pitching a news story to your local news station.
- Challenge all your members to "stretch" during the anniversary year by giving an amount <u>every</u> month during 2019 to the Legacy Fund. For instance, if only 179,000 of us gave only \$18.69 twelve times—once per month—in 2019, we would exceed our entire campaign goal! Could you suggest that each member give \$20 per month, or more?
- Honor your leaders by presenting them with the special 150th Mission Recognition pin or the 150th necklace.
- Continue your 150th celebrations in 2019 at Mission u, Annual Conference, conference and district Annual Meetings, and all conference, district, and local events next year.

Where do you find the resources you need for your regular Legacy Fund displays and for your anniversary celebrations? First, contact your conference Legacy Fund Liaison. She can help provide commitment (pledge) envelopes, blank "150" note cards, a one-pager describing the Legacy Fund, a promotional flyer for the special 150th anniversary pin and necklace, and copies of the new "fun-raiser," planned giving, and Legacy Fund brochures. And finally, you'll find further information and resources such as the Legacy Fund toolkit on the Legacy Fund website: unitedmethodistwomen.org/150.
