Frances Womack Yelton October 3, 1923 - February 11, 2019

Frances Womack Yelton, 95 years of age, died on Monday, February 11, 2019 at her home in Rutherfordton, N.C. Mrs. Yelton was a life long member of Gilboa United Methodist Church where she served as treasurer for over fifty years and was a loval member of the United Methodist Women. When Joanie Strohm was President of the Blue Ridge District UMW she became aware that Mrs. Yelton was the sole member of the local unit there at Gilboa and asked her if she was going to continue as such. Mrs. Yelton was such an avid, devoted member she insisted that as long as she was able she would continue as the United Methodist Women's unit at Gilboa and for several years she did so, making her pledge and contributing to other channels of giving. She was such an inspiration to those of us on the District Executive team that we decided to honor her in some way and at the 2015 Annual Meeting she was presented a Gift to Mission Pin by Mrs. Strohm. Mrs. Yelton's dedication and example of what service one person could accomplish was discussed in the Executive Meeting of the Blue Ridge District on March 2, 2019. It was suggested by Fran Jordan, President that we send a Gift in Memory Card to her family and was voted in the affirmative by the entire team. Not only that but we also voted to name the Blue Ridge District Scholarship to the Conference Annual Meeting "The Frances Yelton Scholarship" in honor of this remarkable lady. Each of us can honor her further by continuing the work of United Methodist Women Mrs. Yelton so strongly believed in.

- 1. Pledge to Mission: Each UMW unit is required to make a pledge to mission for the year. Making and meeting this pledge fulfills the first requirement for becoming a Mission Today Unit as well as giving in all five channels.
- 2. Gift to Mission: Several types of cards are available for various occasions. These cards are \$5 each and are an excellent way to remember a person at that special time in their life.
- 3. Gift in Memory: Cards are free, with donations beginning at \$5. Unit treasurer will include Gift in Memory contributions on their quarterly remittance form. This is a wonderful way to remember those who have passed away.

- 4. Special Mission Recognition: Pins are available at costs beginning at \$40. These pins are a way to recognize that special person in your unit, church, or community. Purchasing a pin is not required for units to contribute in this channel of giving. Contributions may be made in any amount.
- 5. World Thank Offering: This is an opportunity for us to respond to God's abundance and grace with gifts of gratitude.

Please also remember to include our Legacy Fund in your giving both individually and as a unit. This fund is vital to the security of our continued mission work in the future as United Methodist Women.

March brought with it our 150th anniversary/birthday. We have a rich history, a world-wide presence and an unlimited potential for the future. This is all due to dedicated women such as yourselves. Nina continues to be one of the most knowledgeable about UMW of all the ladies I have met through the years. She was an avid reader and read every single word of each Response magazine. Sarah was a true lady and when I first met her. She gave me a linen handkerchief and said every southern lady needed to carry one (don't know why she thought I should have one. Lady???? I don't know!) I never heard her say an angry or unkind word. Over the years those two and I shared so much including much laughter and I always felt they would champion me in whatever I attempted in life. Sadly, Sarah passed away several years ago (I still have the hankie) and just within the last month Nina has been admitted to a rehabilitation center. I will always treasure the memories of the time I spent with these much loved friends and will mourn the loss of how things once were but will celebrate how much they enriched my life.

As we celebrated our 150th birthday and as we spent so much time reflecting on the past I feel there were ladies you remembered whose laughter, touch and influence helped to develop you into the person you are, personally, as a United Methodist Woman and as a Christian. So the true purpose of this particular letter is to encourage you to share those stories because they are as meaningful as all those long ago memories we have just celebrated and might have an impact on those new to our organization.

Historian

United Methodist Women: Living History: History can be scrapbooks, tattered clippings and faded photographs. There is also personal, family and community history recounted orally or in published records. United Methodist Women has family history, some better known than others.

Among of the "ancestors" of United Methodist Women are the women of the Methodist Protestant Church. A Woman's Foreign Missionary Society was organized in Pittsburg in 1879; their first missionary, Harriett Brittain went to Japan the following year. Later missionaries went to China and India, The Home Missionary Society was organized in Bridgeton, NJ in 1893.

Methodist Protestants were prominent in North Carolina. The women of the North Carolina Branch (conference) hosted nine national meetings of the Societies in Grace Church, Greensboro and 1st Church, High Point in 1902, 1914, 1926 and 1936. The Home Missionary Society initiated plans and supported a Children's Home in Denton (later moved to High Point) based on a 1908 report of 8000 orphans in North Carolina not being cared for in an institution. Mrs. Minnie Lee Hancock Hammer of Asheboro held offices as NC Branch Recording Secretary and later president. She became national Recording Secretary in1923 and national president in 1928. She died n 1959 and is buried in the Asheboro City Cemetery.

Is your church a "descendant" of the Methodist Protestant Church? St. Paul's Church in Asheville has Methodist Protestant roots.

Program Resources




Greetings everyone, and Happy Spring! It's still brisk and cool where I live, but I'm looking forward to a warm spring & summer and I hope I get to see many of you!

America. Carla is a young girl who's in charge of her 6-year-old brother Junior. They flee the escalating violence in Honduras to make the arduous, horrendous trip across Mexico to the United States. Their experience will grip you and haunt you—it's incredulous what Carla is willing to give up, and risk losing—just to get to a place where she feels she belongs. It is not pretty, but after reading this book I "got it."

Thank you for your kind words at the prayer breakfast. This "new way" of ordering will likely take a while to catch on with everyone, so please do NOT hesitate to contact me if I can help you in any way AT ALL. I want to make this transition as easy as possible for as many as possible!

Program Advisory Group

You may consider my letter as "hot off the press" because I have just returned from the annual Board of Directors and Program Advisory Group meeting at Scarritt-Bennett in Nashville, Tennessee. If you have never been to Scarlett-Bennett, I suggest you organize a visit to see this retreat center owned by United Methodist Women.

As with every UMW event, the JOY was connecting with friends from across the country. My consistent roommate for national meetings is from South Dakota. I have never been there, but she is coming here next October.

There was WORSHIP at each session. Here is a quote from one worship service(as best as I remember it.) "If you go with Jesus, He will open doors for you, and you will see things you may not want to see, but you can't NOT see because you are with Jesus."

There were REPORTS. There was a lengthy session on debriefing the recent General Conference and a push to encourage more women to be elected to be delegates to the next conference. Proposed 2020 General Conference Resolutions were reviewed. (I have those if you want to know more.) The report on the Day of Giving will be ready by mid April, along with an updated report on the Legacy Fund. (Much more about this in my next letter.)

There were WORKSHOPS for the entire group together. One was on Eliminating Institutional Racism. I recommend the book SO YOU WANT TO TALK ABOUT RACE. There will be a webinar presentation later this year, and you may want to participate. The second workshop was on the climate justice campaign called "Just Energy for All". I have resources for that.

And as I promised at the last WNCC executive meeting, I raised my concern that more needs to be done to support and resource local women. The two examples I gave were: 1. Being told that pledge cards were not available this year, that we should download and print them ourselves. When I did that for our Skyland Unit, it cost me \$37.50. 2. Being told that new member packets were not currently available, that these, too, we could download and print. Three women came to me immediately after I spoke and said they heartily agree with me. Then a New York office staff person told me she would "take this to New York and see what can be done". So stay tuned.

I have come home encouraged by the stories about the work UMW has been doing for 150 years (You really must hear the stories Clara Ester tells about the Bethlehem Centers.) And I have come home inspired to do all I/we can as United Methodist Women for the present and the future.



Hygiene Kit

Hygiene kits provide basic necessities to people who have been forced to leave their homes because of human conflict or natural disaster. Hygiene kits are also used as learning tools in personal hygiene, literacy, nutrition, and cooking classes. **Hygiene Kit Value:** \$12 per kit

Assembly

1 hand towel

- 15" x 25" to 17"x 27":
- Kitchen, cleaning, and microfiber towels not acceptable.

1 washcloth

1 comb

- Comb needs to be sturdy longer than 6 inches:
- No pocket combs or picks please;
- Rattail combs and combs without handles are acceptable with a minimum of 6 inches of teeth.

1 metal nail file or nail clippers

No emery boards, please

1 bath-size soap

- 3 oz. and larger sizes only;
- No Ivory or Jergens soap due to moisture content;
- Do not remove from original packaging.

1 toothbrush

- Adult size only;
- Do not remove from original packaging.

6 adhesive bandages

- ³/₄" to 1"-size;
- Common household Band-Aids.

1 plastic bag

· One-gallon size sealable bag only.

\$1.00 to purchase toothpaste

Assembly Directions

Set the \$1.00 for toothpaste aside to be included in a separate envelope. Lay out the hand towel flat on a table. Lay the washcloth flat in the center of the hand towel. Place all remaining items on top of the washcloth. Fold over the sides of the hand towel to cover all of the items. Fold over one end of the hand towel so that it covers all of the items. Grasp the bundle of items tightly and roll over the remainder of the hand towel tightly. Place the tightly rolled bundle in the plastic bag. Remove as much air as possible and seal the bag.

Important Notes

- All items must be new.
- Do not wash any of the items as they will be considered used.
- Please remove all packaging, unless otherwise specified.
- All emergency kits are carefully planned to make them usable in the greatest number of situations.
 Due to the fact that strict rules often govern product entry into international countries, it is important that kits contain only the requested items, nothing more.
- Do not include any personal notes, money, or additional material in the kits. These things must be painstakingly removed and will delay the shipment.
- UMCOR is now purchasing toothpaste in bulk to be added to health kits before shipping to ensure that the product does not expire before they are sent. <u>Do not put single dollar bills in</u> <u>each kit</u>. Collect all money for toothpaste and shipping, then place it in a separate envelope and send along with the kit donations.
