# **Education and Interpretation**

I regret that we only had around 30 persons attending our Mission Study on May 11, but considering the fact that the date had been changed twice and a lot of other events were going on, the low attendance was somewhat expected. We thank the women of St. Paul's for hosting the event.

Our speaker, Steve Taylor did a wonderful job. For those of us going to Mission U, we look forward to having Steve be study leader for "The Gospel of Mark and Radical Discipleship." Our own, Deaconess Barbara Campbell, will be a study leader for "Women United for Change: 150 Years in Mission." Hope you can join us. Mission U is a wonderful learning experience with great fellowship and heartwarming worship..

I was a bit overwhelmed with the response at the Prayer Breakfast and at the Mission Study as to how many hygiene kits and Items for Haywood Street Respite Care were donated. We received over 200 hygiene kits for UMCOR, and a total of close to 1200 items for Respite Care, including over 200 combs and/or brushes, 127 toothbrushes, 132 tubes of toothpaste, 138 bars of soap or body shampoo, 145 bottles of shampoo/conditioner, and 133 pairs of socks. I was personally able to deliver the items and take a tour of the facility. After speaking with the director, I discovered other necessities they could use. I will have the list available if we do this again in the future or if your unit would like to make items available directly to the Respite Care contact me for ideas.

Thanks to all of you for your ongoing support of women, children, and youth as faithful United Methodist Women.

# Social Action

Hi Everyone, It has been a very busy spring so far! I hope you each had an opportunity to go to the Spiritual Growth Retreat this weekend. Our retreat leader, Deaconess Clara Ester was truly amazing and inspirational. In our divisive world it is important that we remember what unites us and serve God by caring for those less fortunate whatever the circumstances.

Legislative Day was held April 27 in Winston-Salem. Our facilitators were Dr. Jennifer Bremer state coordinator for Fair Elections at the League of Women Voters of NC and Kathy Fitzjeffries a social

worker wiyth Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools who is passionate about her advocacy for social and racial justice. Dr. Bremer spoke about Voter Rights/ Redistricting Reform. Map rigging can change our democracy and she supports bipartisan effort for gerrymandering reform. Visit <u>Fair Districts North Carolina</u> to endorse 5 principles for reasonable redistricting reform.

Ms. Fitzjeffries advocates for Interrupting the School to Prison Pipeline. 200,000 youth are tried, sentenced, or incarcerated each year in the US, impacting education including college, job opportunities and the risk of becoming a repeat offender. Since 1970 our prison population has increased almost 700%. 60% are people of color but there are other factors. Socioeconomics also plays an important role. More money goes to prisons than to education. Everyone's story matters! Often, if it doesn't affect you its not a problem. Try to look outside your community the ever growing prison population affects all of us.

And finally, some of our members attended a forum on Raising the Minimum Wage in NC to a fair living wage. Visit Just Economics of Western North Carolina | Living Wage and Transit and Affordable Housing or call 505-7466 for more information. Just Economics works to center the voice of people most impacted by economic injustice to bring about systems change and co-create the economic community we want to live in.

# Delores Meadows, Blue Ridge District Nomination Committee Chair

One of United Methodist Women's Social Action National Campaigns is "A Living Wage for All." Those of us who live in or near Asheville know that we are in the most expensive place in North Carolina to live due to the cost of housing. Add that to the fact that many of the jobs in this area are low-wage service jobs, we have many families and individuals that struggle each month to pay their bills and put food on the table. Some people having to work two or even three jobs to make ends meet. A "living wage" in this area is now \$12.15 if it is a job that provides benefits; a job without benefits is over \$13. The minimum wage in NC is now at \$7.25. The month of July will mark the 10th anniversary since the state legislature has increased the minimum wage.

Just Economics is an organization that is working toward a just and sustainable economy for all in Western NC. This group recognizes those businesses in our area that provide a "living wage" for their employees. I have made of list of a few restaurants that are "Living Wage Certified." Each of us has the power of the purse, and I hope that you will make an effort to visit some of these businesses. Let them know that you are there to support a just wage for all. You may visit the website (justeconomicswnc.org) for a more complete list of employers who provide a "living wage." Also see page 13.

Just Economics will be holding a rally in downtown Asheville on July 24 to mark the 10th Anniversary since the minimum wage has been increased. I do not have many details at this time, but please watch local news sources for more information. This event will be called an UnHappy Birthday Party. They would appreciate your support!

# Historian

United Methodist Women: Living History. History can be scrapbooks, tattered clippings and faded photographs. History is personal, family and community centered. History is also structure and organization.

The Central (segregated) Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church existed from 1940-1968. It created separate "black" and "white" districts and conferences that occupied the same geography without personal or denomination relationships. "Black" conferences were organized by race; "white" ones by geography.

After 1940 the 17 (Black) Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction (CJ) stretched from the Atlantic Ocean as far west as Texas and Colorado. The Southeastern Jurisdiction (SEJ) had two annual conferences in the state of North Carolina; the Central Jurisdiction had one which encompassed the whole state. Consider the implication of such distances for frequency of committee meetings, travel time and expenses for officers and members.

Three Central Jurisdiction officers lived within the bounds of the Western North Carolina Conference: Mrs. G. Haven Caldwell of Winston-Salem, Children's Work, 1940-48; Mrs. G. M. Phelps of Greensboro, Treasurer, 1948-56; and Mrs. Alvin Morrison of Statesville, Missionary Education, 1960-68. In 1963 the Central Jurisdiction (five day) School of Christian Mission and Guild Weekend were held at Bennett College; Mrs. Alvin Morrison was the Dean. Members attending, usually traveling by bus, came from as far as Kentucky, Delaware, Texas, Michigan, Louisiana and Florida. Mrs. Jettie Morrison of Stateville was North Carolina (CJ) Conference President.

In 1962-63 (latest available) the North Carolina Conference (CJ) had 124 societies with 2205 members. The total funds sent "to New York" was \$6149.87 which included giving from the Wesleyan Service Guild, children and youth societies. *This too is part of our history.*

Are you familiar with the word "respite"? If you are thinking that I am talking about taking a break from working for The Legacy Fund, no, I am not. In fact, we will begin a new phase of the fund at the end of the summer, and I will meet with the Legacy Fund Steering Committee in New Jersey in October. We have received over \$26 million toward our goal, and we will continue working until we reach our \$60 million goal.

No, I am talking about the respite care that is offered at Brooks-Howell. I am on the Brooks-Howell Advisory Board, and so I "sort of" knew about it. But now because my husband's health does not allow me to leave him home alone, I took a closer look at what is available. I talked with Jill Knight, the admissions coordinator, and with great trepidation, I applied for respite care for my husband so that I could attend the WNC Conference Spiritual Growth Retreat at Lake Junaluska. (I say with great trepidation because, as I told Jill, I never even left our dog in a kennel. How could I trust anyone else to take care of my husband?)

Respite care at Brooks-Howell turned out to be the best thing I could possibly have done. My husband had a private room and excellent nursing care, meals in the dining room, chapel participation, and time for visiting with B-H residents. I had the break I needed to refresh my own spirit. Will I do it again when I have an out of town meeting? Absolutely!

If I sound like I am singing the praises of Brooks-Howell, I am. If you are in need of respite care for someone for whom you are responsible, call Jill Knight at 253-6712 for more information. You will be singing, too!
