Our Mission Walks have been a wonderful way to raise money in support and help for women, children and youth around the world!! Thank you for your time and support to collect donations and/or walk for missions. We have had two walks so far and are a little less than halfway of reaching our goal of \$3500!! So far we have raised \$1700! Last year we went over our goal & I know that we can do that again this year!!

Remember the unit with the most people walking is entered in a drawing for a mission recognition pin to give to whomever they choose!

So far at Dan Nicholas Park, Providence UMC had the most walkers with 3 & at Grimes Park in Lexington, First Lexington had the most with 9 walkers. There was \$900 raised at the Lexington walk which was fantastic!! Encourage your units to come out and walk to be eligible to win the pin! The last two walks are at Randolph Mall on June 29<sup>th</sup> and then July 27<sup>th</sup> at Monroe Mall, both from 9-11 am.

Also think of creative ways to raise money: one group got buckets from Kentucky Fried Chicken and placed them in Sunday School Classrooms & asked for donations!! They received over \$200 this way! You can have walks at your church & have people sponsor you or walks in your community. You can collect money for missions after church one Sunday or place jars around your church and ask people to put their spare change in them and then add it all together and put in one check from your church. The money collected does not have to be from only the walk at the park or mall the day of the event. Think "out of the box" of ways to collect the money so that women, children & youth can be helped around the world!

#### MATERNAL MORTALITY

According to the UN Office of Human Rights, maternal mortality has become a looming human rights issue in our world, and now especially in our USA. Alarmingly, twice as many pregnancy-related deaths occur today in our country as there were in 1987, whereas, according to UNICEF, world-wide maternal deaths have decreased by around 54% between 1990 and 2015. The CDC (Center for Disease Control) reports that our country's black and Native American women have the highest mortality rates of all groups, as well as women between the ages of 34-44. Our various states also have widely ranging statistics. For example, Louisiana has 58.1 maternal deaths per 100,000 births per year, whereas in California there are only 4 per 100,000 deaths per births. In California, maternal death rate has been cut in half since 2006, when the state prioritized maternal and child care, and has instituted consistent safety practices.

Our UMW is supporting the proposal to establish Maternal Mortality Review Committees. Collecting data on pregnancy-related deaths across the country has often been haphazard or non-existent in some hospitals, and those who do keep data do not have a standardized system country-wide to share data and come up with standardized, improved care approaches for all pregnancy providers.

Sadly, in our country the majority of pregnancy-related deaths could be preventable. They are often due to various pregnancy and delivery complications, inadequate diagnoses, and failure to tend to emergencies. Other factors at play for pregnant women are lack of insurance, high costs, inaccessibility to clinics/ hospitals due to distance, time or transportation, lack of education about prenatal self-care, and lack of medical post-partum follow-up.

#### Who Do You Say that I Am? Meeting Jesus Through the Eyes of Mark



Author Carolyn Polling will guide youth through the Gospel of Mark, helping them to define who Jesus is to them. The goal of the study is to help youth explore scripture in new ways, so they can develop their own faith and put it into action.

COST: \$150 per student. Local UMW units are encouraged to contribute toward this cost.

AGE: Mission a Youth Camp is open to high school students who are rising 9th graders through those who have just completed 12" grade.

SPECIAL NEEDS: If you have any physical conditions that require consideration in room or classroom assignment please explain on registration form or on separate sheet of paper stapled to your form.

HOUSING: Housing will be in a college dorm.


