Mission Today Units for 2018: Congratulations to 2018 Mission Today Units! Look for your unit name to be listed in the program at Annual Celebration.

UMCOR & Project AGAPE Donations: On behalf of the recipients of the kits you brought to Spiritual Growth Retreat, **Thank You! And a special Thank You** to those who helped to process the kits. We processed 640 School Kits at a value of \$7,040.00 and 523 Hygiene Kits at a value of \$6,276.00. Your gifts of these 1,163 kits are valued at \$13,316.00. Monetary donations came to \$1,681.00. That is a total of **\$14,997.00!** (Kits collected at Mission u will be reported later.)

We are collecting Christmas Shoeboxes for Project Armenia at Annual Celebration. Bring boxes to Annual Celebration or take them to your District Annual Celebration. Shoeboxes are valued at \$35.00 per box and need a **\$5.00 donation for shipping**. Go to www.wnccumw.org to see specific packing instructions for each UMCOR kit as well as the Christmas boxes. UMCOR's greatest need now is for School Kits and Hygiene Kits; **there is an overabundance of Cleaning Buckets, so please hold off on making those until further notice.** Please bring your kits in boxes that you can easily lift. If you can't lift them, the kit intake volunteers probably can't lift them.

Saying Farewell to Dwaine Morgan: Dwaine Morgan, Manager of our Mission Response Center in Terrell, NC, is retiring at the end of 2019. Getting to Know Your WNCC Mission Institutions: Brooks-Howell Home: "Called—Served—Serving Still"

The offering taken at the 1954 Fourth Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild was to be used "in some way for retired deaconesses and missionaries for whom it was responsible." A new retirement home was needed, and a survey of active and retired missionaries and deaconesses showed they desired cultural opportunities, multiple Methodist churches and good climate. Asheville was chosen, and Brooks-Howell Home was named to honor both Mrs. Frank G. Brooks, then national president, and Miss Mabel K. Howell, former professor of missions at Scarritt College, who taught more missionaries and deaconesses than any other person.

Property was purchased in 1956 and 9 residents moved into an existing house in 1957 while awaiting the completion of the main building (now the Bethea Building) in 1961. Later buildings were named for other mission leaders. New residents became actively involved in service at the Home, in local social and advocacy agencies, and in the Methodist churches.

The International Room, the corridors, and the lobbies reflect the history and the life experiences of residents. For example, the 2nd-floor elevator lobby houses the display case from the Founders' Room at Tremont Church in Boston. The two stained glass windows in the front lobby are part of the donations from "the castle," Mrs. George O. Robinson's home in Pasadena (given to the church as a home for retired missionaries).

Amenities include intermediate and long-term care, a chapel, library, Mission Archives Library, spiritual life events, an in-house TV channel, a gift shop, and physical, occupational, speech, and pool therapies. Independent residents' projects include the Employee Gift Fund (for hourly employees at Christmas), Change-For-Change (pocket change collected for a mission project selected by the residents), and the United Way Fund Drive.

On a space-available basis, BHH serves the community through its Outreach Ministry by receiving persons who need respite and health care. Since 2016 BHH has been recognized by Just Economics as a Living Wage Certified Employer. More recently an on-site clinic and a health equipment lending program benefit not only residents but also United Methodists in the community. The B.E.A.R. (Baby Equipment And Resources) Closet at the Church is jointly sponsored with St. Paul's UM Church and Pre-School.

BHH is owned, operated, and financially supported by the National Office of UMW. As owners they pay insurance and for major repairs and renovations. The Call to Prayer offering once each quadrennium helps fund the pension and health care needs of all deaconesses and missionaries for whom they are responsible.

Justice Today and the Campaign to End Maternal Mortality



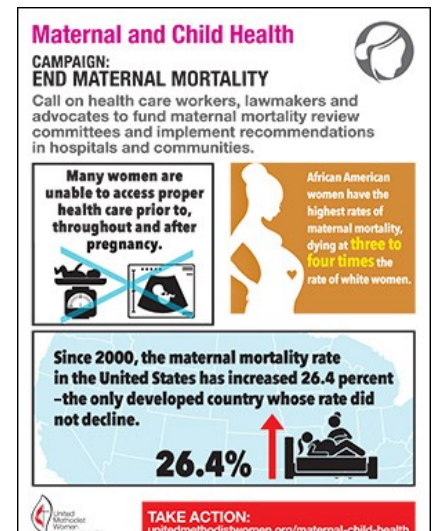
“The United States has the worst rate of maternal deaths in the developed world”, according to an NPR report on May 12, 2017. We assume the US has the best hospitals, the best physicians, and the best health care workers, and by and large we do. Yet, “every year in the U.S., 700 to 900 women die from complications of pregnancy or childbirth-related causes, and some 65,000 nearly die—by many measures, the worst record in the developed world”.

There are several reasons the U.S. has had an increase in maternal mortality of 26.4% since 2000. “New mothers are older than they used to be, with more complex medical histories. Half of pregnancies in the U.S. are unplanned, so many women don't address chronic health issues beforehand. Greater prevalence of C-sections leads to more life-threatening complications. The fragmented health system makes it harder for new mothers, especially those without good insurance, to get the care they need. Confusion about how to recognize worrisome symptoms and treat obstetric emergencies makes caregivers more prone to error. (NPR, May 12, 2017).” **African American women have the highest rates of maternal mortality, dying at three to four times the rate of white women. Hispanic women have a lower rate than African American women but higher than white women.** (You may access the NPR report at www.npr.org or simply Google maternal mortality in the United States.)

Our foremothers made the choice to act to save women's lives. They chose to build hospitals and clinics, to train women and girls to serve as doctors and nurses, and to send missionaries to begin the work. In 1869, Dr. Clara Swain was sent to Bareilly, India, to provide quality medical care to women.

For 150 years UMW members have focused on issues that affect women, children, and youth. Social action has increased our awareness, urged us to action, and provided funding for programs around the world. We have before us now the issue of maternal mortality. Awareness is a necessary first step. The United Methodist Women website has several resources, including a poster about Maternal and Child Health and a video from Nyadire, Zimbabwe about our support of a school for midwives, at www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/mchealth.

Social Action Priority: A Living Wage for All!



United Methodist Women's Living Wage for All Campaign seeks to engage members as allies in passing state and local legislation that lays the base for a living wage for everyone. **A living wage is what it takes for a family to meet basic needs of housing, food, transportation, utilities, etc., in their locale.** UMW joins with several faith and labor coalitions working to raise the minimum wage to \$15 per hour (see list of partners below).

How is North Carolina faring in terms of a living wage?

The **current state minimum wage of \$7.25 per hour** is the lowest amount a non-exempt employee can legally be paid for hourly work. Special minimum wage rates, such as the "North Carolina waitress minimum wage" for tipped employees, may apply to certain workers. Employers may pay tipped employees as little as \$2.13 an hour as long as each employee earns enough in tips to make up the difference between \$2.13 and the minimum wage of \$7.25.



A full-time minimum wage worker working **40** hours a week, **52** weeks a year, will earn **\$58.00** per day, **\$290.00** per week, and **\$15,080.00** per year. The national poverty line for a family unit consisting of two people is \$16,020.00 per year.

North Carolina employers may pay 18-year-old's and minors the youth minimum wage of **\$4.25** for the first 90 days of employment. Other labor law exemptions for minors may exist.

Proposed: House Bill 366 Raising Wages for NC Workers

This bill would increase the state minimum wage from \$7.25 an hour to \$15 over a five-year period ending in 2024.

Treasurer Tidbit\$: Our Pledge Determines our Future

In the previous Conference Gram, I wrote the following: “Although we did not lead the nation in Pledge or Total Giving, the 2018 giving report from the National Office indicates that Western North Carolina United Methodist Women led the nation in: Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, World Thank Offering, and Designated Gifts.”



We also reported that WNCC UMW is leading the nation in giving to the Legacy Fund. All of that is certainly something to celebrate.

In trying to sound positive, I missed saying something important. “Not leading the nation in Pledge” is not something that should automatically concern us. But something stated in the second issue of the Conference Gram should:

Our Undesignated Giving, driven by our Pledge to Mission, has been consistently declining over the past nine years.

That means our most basic building block in support of our Missions, the foundation of our Legacy, has been eroding while the costs of supporting those Missions has steadily increased. These facts need to be shared more often and more vocally.

The word “pledge” implies taking a stand for something, making a commitment to something. **Making and meeting a pledge is possibly the most totally personal and powerful action we take as individuals in support of the Mission of United Methodist Women.**

We cannot undo the past, but as we continue in the second half of 2019, let’s personally recommit to raising the awareness of the need for and importance of our Pledge to Mission and acting to do something about it. Our future is built on today’s actions.

“Are you a voting delegate?”

This is a common question when a UMW member is registering for Conference Annual Celebration, whether onsite or online. The most common response is, “I don’t know...”

Well, here is how you will know if you are a voting delegate at Annual Celebration!



According to our Conference standing rules (page 24), you are a voting delegate IF:

- you are representing your local unit which has a membership of 50 members or less. If your unit has more than 50 members, there is one additional voting delegate for each additional 50 members. (Example, a unit of 150 members would have three voting delegates.) *Decide WHO is going to be representing your unit as a voting delegate before the Conference Annual Celebration. Typically, the president of the local unit serves as the voting delegate.
- you are a District officer or a chairperson of a District committee. (Nominating committee members are not voting delegates **unless** they represent their local unit.)

Who are the voting delegates at District Annual Celebrations?

“The voting body of the District shall be composed of local unit members in attendance at the District Annual Celebration.” If you attend your District Annual Celebration and are a member of a local unit, you are a voting delegate. So now you know!

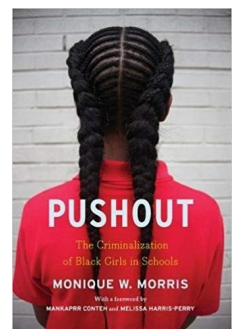
