Important Moments of Racial Justice History in the United States

and United Methodist Women

Human rights for all people is one of the historic principles of United Methodist Women. God is the creator of all people of all races, and we are all God's children. Therefore, opportunities for fellowship and service, personal growth and freedom in every aspect of life are inherent rights of everyone.

United Methodist Women from its beginnings has tried to build a community and social order without racial barriers, as this timeline shows. Racial justice is an ongoing focus of the United Methodist Women mission as members work to promote racial justice in the United States and around the world.

1857 – 1939: The United States ends slavery, but it also moves to entrench racism and white privilege through wars, economic expansion and immigration policies.

Women of the United Methodist tradition reach out across the United States and the world.

1940 – 1962: The Cold War and decolonization change ideas and realities in the United States.

Women of the United Methodist tradition expand study and advocacy for racial justice.

1963 – 1975: Civil Rights, the antiwar movement, the War on Poverty and expanding immigration change the face of the United States.

The new organization of United Methodist Women (1972) seeks to increase diversity of membership, leadership and participation.

1975 – 1999: Racial and ethnic economic inequalities grow, fueled by globalization's free market strategies.

Charter for Racial Justice Policies continues and strengthens racial justice witness of United Methodist Women.

2000 – present: The 9/11 attacks and world events alter the racial dynamics of the United States.

United Methodist Women members face new challenges of diversity within the movement and complexity of racial justice issues in society.

This fight can be found in countries around the world. This fight needs us all to speak up for those who work in dangerous conditions, work long hours for little pay, and work without the security of guaranteed hours.

In We Are All Fast-Food Workers Now The Global Uprising Against Poverty Wages, Annelise Orleck "traces the evolution of a new global labor movement sparked and sustained by low-wage workers." She tells the stories of workers who feel the impact of free trade policies as they fight for a living wage. She shares their struggles and heartaches, their resistance and rebellion, and their hope for change and better living and working conditions.

If you are looking for your next reading program book, this one is a good pick. It will push your thinking and challenge you to take a closer look at how and where you are spending your money, and who is benefiting from your spending. This a great book to spark discussion and change.

My Dear Sisters,

I am having a great time serving as your Social Action Mission Coordinator and seeing all of you at Conference and District functions. As promised we will continue to look at our priorities and for this quarter we are looking at Economic Inequality. Please continue to share the information with your local units.

Income and wealth inequality impacts women and communities of color in the United States. There is a shift in the way wealth is distributed in our country which makes life difficult for the majority. Income for the top 1% of the population has grown 185% over the past 35 years; income for the rest of the population has increased an average of only 13%.

Jobs are paying minimum wage (or less for tipped workers), which cannot sustain a family. Women make up 75% of the low wage workers and are disproportionately women of color. We see the cost of higher education and student debt putting strain on families, most especially young families.

Despite the booming of the housing market, there is housing crisis as we see housing programs on the decline. Even though there are significant changes to health care access we are still experiencing health crisis which places financial burden on families. The root cause for all of this is as a result of specific policies that have shifted the wealth of this country to the top: cuts in taxes for the wealthy, corporate tax cuts, cuts in public services, etc.

We as United Methodist Women are asked to educate ourselves on these issues and understand how these impact women, youth and children. Our United Methodist Social Principles affirm, "We support measures that would reduce the concentration of wealth in the hands of few." (Social Principles, The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, 2008, P. 163).

The prophets warn us that an economic system based on greed, economic exploitation, and the indifference to the needs of the poor is contrary to God's will and leads to ruin for the society (Amos 8:4-6; Jeremiah 22:13-17)." (*Resolution 4052, "Economic Justice for a New Millennium,"* The Book of Resolutions of The United Methodist Church, 2012, pp. 546-547)

Are we too busy shopping for that perfect gift for those on our list, decorating our homes, and planning that special meal to take the time to celebrate the birth of our Savior and to thank God for sending His son as the ultimate sacrifice for our sins? Again, do we do anything to help those less fortunate than us, who may not even have a family to celebrate with?

Then comes January and the beginning of a new year. Before we begin a new year, let's take a look back on this year. On March 23, 2019, the 150th Birthday of United Methodist Women, we had a great time Celebrating the Past, Embracing the Future at the Metro District Prayer Breakfast. What About Our Money was the topic for our Mission Study held on May 18, 2019. June 13-15, 2019 we were at Lake Junaluska for the 2019 Spiritual Growth Retreat with a theme of Thorns and Roses with Deaconess Clara Ester as the retreat leader. At Mission u, July 18-21, 2019, we studied Women United For Change, 150 Years in Mission, women who brought about change in their communities. 
