A NOTE FROM MISSION EDUCATION & INTERPRETATION:	
I just got back from a terrific weekend from our Conference UMW Annual Meeting. Keynote Speaker—Christi Campos; Mission Speaker—Dr. Belinda Forbes; and Musicians—Dr. Rev Mark Barden and Catherine Ritch. I also worked checking in the Kits for UMCOR and Agape Christmas Shoeboxes for the Armenia children. We collected 372 Hygiene Kits, 210 School Kits and 544 Christmas Shoeboxes, and \$29,000 was collected for shipping and tooth paste.	
We will be saying farewell to Dwaine Morgan, Manager of our Mission Response Center, Terrell, NC, after 16 years and retiring at the end of 2019. A way to honor Dwaine would be to schedule a work day at the Response Center. There are some jobs that can be done sitting down. Call Dwaine to schedule a work day at 828-478-2106. Youth groups are welcome. Dwaine said he will probably be open 7 days a week.	
Thanks to all the Units that brought Kits to our District Annual Meeting or to my house. Our Missions Festival is coming up very quickly—November 16th. One activity that we will be doing is assembling Hygiene Kits. Debbie Ray, President, sent an email on August 16th requesting certain Units to bring specific items and also money for shipping and tooth paste. If you could get the items requested and brought to my house, or I will come and pick them upit would be so much more convenient if I had the items before the day of the event.

SOME THOUGHTS FROM MEMBERSHIP, NURTURE & OUTREACH:

What are the emotions you feel when you sit down to watch the evening news and see children being separated from their parents and placed in cages (or what looks to be the equivalent of cages). Do you feel horror, sadness, fear, anger, helplessness, hopelessness, compassion, nothing? Do you want to do something, but don't quite know how to begin.

I have recently read two books (both of which are on our United Methodist Women's reading list) that I am strongly recommending for every member to read. "The Same Sky" written by Amanda Eyre Ward is a book about the hardships endured when a twelve year old girl, along with her younger brother, set out from Honduras to find their mother living in Texas. It is heart wrenching to learn about the horrors they encounter along the way and I guarantee it will leave you with an urgency to get involved. The other book I read most recently "Detained and Deported," authored by Margaret Regan, contains many accounts of individuals...men, women and children who are making that long journey toward a better life in the United States.

What are we called to do as United Methodist Women as we continue to turn faith, hope and love into action? We can become better informed. We can pray for those making the journey and for the individuals and groups who are physically caring for the children and adults in detention and those who are sent back to their homelands and all the risks they take searching for a better life for themselves and their families.

SERVING COMMUNITY: Dorcas, also called Tabitha, is named in Acts 9 as a disciple, one of the few women officially afforded this title. Her story is given only seven verses in the Bible, but with those seven verses she has inspired generations of women with her faithful living in service to God's beloved. Chances are many of you belong to a United Methodist Women circle named after her.

"She was devoted to good works and acts of charity," Acts 9:36 tells us. We meet her only after she has died and the community has turned out in despair. The disciple Peter, in a nearby town, is summoned to where Dorcas' body lay. "All the widows stood beside him weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them" (Acts 9:39). Dorcas, it seems, has taken seriously the scriptural call to care for the widows. We don't learn much about Dorcas, but the outpouring of grief at her death tells us she was an important member of her community—so much so that Peter was inspired to raise her from the dead, news of which "became known throughout Joppa" and surely inspired others to join the community of believers.

Dorcas devoted her life to serving and building community. She lives on in the tunics and other clothing made by the hands of Christin women today, in the prayer shawls and quilts and hats and blankets crafted and in the creative, supportive communities built by United Methodist Women members around the world.
