#### From Your President:

Wow! Last year flew by and I hope you received a blessing from all that UMW was able to accomplish. I know local units are active and busy, but I hope you will plan to participate in district and conference events as well. They help us grow and stretch our faith. Our mission study event is just around the corner. See information about this in this newsletter. Last year we celebrated 150 years in mission. Since I believe UMW will be around another 150 years, we need to think about what that 150 years will look like.

Remember to promote programs and prayers around our 4 top priorities for this quadrennium: climate justice, maternal & child health, mass incarceration & criminalization of communities of color, and economic inequality. Do your programs and missions reflect our values? Included in this newsletter are the conference goals and vision for 2020. As a local unit you may have additional goals. We have included a copy of the new Mission Today criteria. With three levels (gold, silver, bronze), I believe every unit will be a Mission Today unit. That's a goal we can all strive to achieve and is a goal for the district. We met our conference goal for 2019 of increasing our giving to Gift to Mission by \$3000 and I encourage you to try to reach the financial goal for 2020 of each member increasing your pledge by \$5. For me, that may be giving up a snack that I don't need anyway, which would accomplish two goals; helping women and children and my health.

Our evaluations for our mission festival in November were very positive. Please share any ideas you have for what we might include in 2020. Thank you to those who have sent in their year-end reports and if you have not done so yet, please move it to the top of your to do list. You should have received the forms in your packets in November, but if mis-placed just let me know. Another district president shared that a member said she put her forms under the Christmas tree so she would be sure to find them. I need to remind you that each unit is requested to complete the UMW national census on the UMW web site. That site is <a href="www.unitedmethodistwomen.org">www.unitedmethodistwomen.org</a>; look for Census 2019. If you don't have a computer, you can have someone help you complete this. It's due by March 30<sup>th</sup> and the national office would like to know more about the local units.

I encourage you to invite your shepherdess to your local unit. We would be happy to provide a program or answer questions or just visit with you. If your unit is not meeting, we will visit on Sunday, come for your fundraiser or special event, or enjoy having lunch with you. If you invite a conference officer to come, you should know that your unit is responsible for their mileage. Plan a visit to the Mission Response Center in 2020. I promise it will be an eye-opener for you. See what happens to your UMCOR kits after they leave your unit. Beverly Bard can help you plan this.

Please include general conference that will take place in May in your daily prayers. There is a lot of concern and confusion surrounding the United Methodist Church right now but nothing will be decided until May. The proposal you are hearing about to separate the church is talking about a way to move forward without dissolving the church. It is a proposal. Since UMW is made up of women from many denominations, I believe we will continue as the strong women's mission organization we have always been. Stay strong sisters and remember God is in control. See you around the district and let me know how I can help you.

Sometimes I have just thought about what we do in missions on a large scale. However, I am thinking that we should also realize that the individual woman or child is the one we can focus on. Our reading program has many books to help us realize the effect that one person, one unit, or one church could have on a person. Can we be the hands and feet of Jesus for one person? Yes. Whether it is time spent with that person or funds given. This is what UMW is all about. Because we are a group of many women, we are reaching not just the one person, but many people.

We have learned to appreciate many cultures, pray for many needs, and help in so many ways. Please remember that we as a group have been able to do so much. In 2019 we were able to send money for undesignated pledge funds and meet a goal. Also, we were able to send \$4,498 to the Legacy Fund to continue the missions into the future. Let us continue to make a difference in 2020.

#### This month's CALL to SOCIAL ACTION is brought to you by Debbie Ray:

There are happenings in the district and I want you to be aware of them. As women who care deeply about children and their families, you make things happen. One of our priority issues this year is maternal & child health. There is a new literacy initiative in the district promoted by WNC Congregations 4 Children encouraging school/church partnerships. There are reading tutors in Haywood County, summer literacy camp in Swain County, summer feeding programs, backpack food programs, and serving as guardian ad-litems. We help provide cribs so babies have a safe place to sleep and provide equipment & clothes that young mothers need. There is also a new conference task force forming to offer training in how to advocate for children at the levels where decisions are made that affect children and their families (state, county & local). We advocate for mothers too. Did you know that the US is the only developed country that had an increase in maternal mortality rates-26.4%? We have to speak out in support of funding for maternal mortality review committees and implement recommendations in hospitals and communities. How else are you promoting this priority, not only here but worldwide? Remember pledge dollars are mission dollars.

#### SPOTLIGHT ON SPIRITUAL GROWTH! Greetings to all new and returning Spiritual Growth Coordinators (SGC's)! Your willingness to serve is appreciated! I I look forward to seeing you at district and conference events, and I hope you will seek me out and introduce yourself. If you are still a little uncertain what your role is as SGC, simply put, you are an encourager and an educator. United Methodist Women offers many spiritual growth resources and opportunities, and it is your job to learn about them and promote their use. Are your units and circles using the Prayer Calendar at meetings by lifting up mission staff who are celebrating birthdays that day, and the mission focus of the day? You could also suggest your members send a card or email to a mission staffer whose birthday is the same as (or near) theirs. Do your meetings include a short devotion? Is your unit including spiritual growth topics in their programs (check your program book, *Response* bible studies, spiritual growth reading program books, mission studies, etc.)? Are you attending, and encouraging your members to attend, district events like Day Apart, Mini-Mission U, Mission Festival (which included a spiritual growth session), and conference events like Spiritual Growth Retreat and Mission U (always includes a spiritual growth study). Doing many of these things meets a Mission Today Unit criteria, but more importantly, is a practice of "intentional faith development." I am excited about this year's district **Day Apart**, which will be Saturday, April 25<sup>th</sup> at Canton First UMC. This year's speaker will be Martha Efird of the Metro District. Martha just completed her term as Conference Spiritual Growth Coordinator. She did a wonderful job, and has been responsible for some really great Conference Spiritual Growth Retreats. I have heard her lead some very inspirational devotionals at Mission U, and I am looking forward to hearing her message at Day Apart. I know it's a sacrifice to give part of your Saturday out of your busy lives, but I hope you will see it as worthwhile, as I do, to spend some time "apart" and be inspired, worshipping together, and connecting with all the wonderful sisters of the Smoky Mountain District. #### PURPOSE OF UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

The organized unit of the UNITED METHODIST WOMEN shall be a community of women whose purpose is to KNOW GOD and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

#### MEMBERSHIP CHALLENGES FOR 2020

Just about everywhere I go in my world of United Methodist Women I hear the same lament, "Our membership is so low and I don't know what to do to change that." Our purpose, which most of us review each time we meet, holds the key to having a vibrant United Methodist Women's Organization. It bids us to "develop a creative, supportive fellowship."

As the coordinator of Membership, Nurture and Outreach I want to challenge each UMW Unit in the Smoky Mountain District to seek one person in each unit to concentrate on inviting women to become a part of United Methodist women. Will you do that? When you find someone willing to serve in that capacity, please let me know the person's name and contact information so that we may explore ways to work together toward building up your membership.

A few points to keep in mind are:

- Remember one does not have to be a member of the United Methodist Church to belong to UMW. So consider inviting your friends, family members, co-workers, teens (our future), etc. Studies show that it takes on the average of seven invitations before a person agrees to become a member of UMW.
- Invite a potential member to a special event and offer to pick her up.
- When a new member joins, find a job for her that is important for which you <u>really</u> need her help. Putting together UMCOR Kits is just one example. Or, ask for her help when you are hosting UMW.
- When someone indicates a desire to become a member, give her a few items that let her know what the organization is all about, e.g. we have a flyer put together by Nancy Jo Willis, our Smoky Mountain District Communications Coordinator, that is entitled "We are Women with a PURPOSE." A copy can be sent to you upon request. A copy of another flyer called "United Methodist Women: It's Your Time," commemorating the first 150 years as an organization. A copy of "The Five Channels of Giving," a daily devotional guide such as "The Upper Room," and anything else you feel is appropriate (maybe a few Hersey's Kisses).

We often hear it said or say it ourselves, "Today is the first day of the rest of your life."... a great reminder to make today count for something good. This, then, is a reminder to you and your group of UMW that 2020 is the first year of our second 150 years and we want to make it even better for those who follow after us. Let that be our legacy!



Think of this resource not as a catalog, as in past years, but as a guide.

By no longer offering books directly, United Methodist Women will make more efficient use of program resources. If you obtain materials locally, this change will also be good for the environment and will help you to become more connected with your community. Although Amazon is always a convenient option, please consider obtaining Reading Program books through:

- School and public libraries
- Local independent bookstores
- Franchises of larger bookstore chains

As always, most Reading Program books can also be found for reading electronically on your Kindle, tablet or other devices. For ebooks free of charge, check your local library, Google eBookstore, Project Gutenberg or Open Library. Searching for titles on Google might yield even more results.

#### **NEW IN 2020:**

Mission Today Gold – Complete 12 criteria: 7 with asterisks (\*) and 5 other.\*\*
Mission Today Silver - Complete 10 criteria: 5 with asterisks (\*) and 5 other.\*\*
Mission Today Bronze - Complete 8 criteria: 4 with asterisks (\*) and 4 other.\*\*

\*\*Note: "Other" may also include items with asterisks (\*).

The purpose of promoting a Mission Today Unit is to:

Energize United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action. Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes. Encourage the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

#### What is a Unit?

A unit is any organized group of United Methodist Women within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles, which periodically get together for a unit meeting.

How Do We Become a Mission Today Unit?

In order to be recognized as a Mission Today Unit, (Gold, Silver or Bronze) UMW units must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated above. #1 of the Criteria is not optional. You must complete this one to become a Mission Today Unit of any level. Activities conducted between January 1-December 31, 2020, will be recognized at annual meetings in 2021. This is an ongoing program, so strive to become a Mission Today Unit!

#### CRITERIA:

- \*1. The Unit will make and meet its Pledge to Mission. (Must be completed.)
- \*2. The unit will use the Prayer Calendar at each general meeting or circle meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth. A new Prayer Calendar is printed each year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- \*3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year. A new Program Book is printed every year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- \*4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit attend the conference Mission u or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study, Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)
- \*5. The unit will have at least two members subscribing to **response** (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members; Local unit subscription may count as one.) Order information is printed at bottom of page 2. \$24.00 for a one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription); \$20 for a one-year digital only subscription.
- \*6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. Possibilities are:
  - a. Have members read and discuss books and articles about other races and cultures;
  - b. Sponsor or attend an interethnic event between two or more units;
  - c. Intentionally recruit women of other ethnic groups to be members and officers of the unit;
  - d. Use the Resources for Racial Justice Available on our conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources."
  - e. Write to elected representatives to support legislation affecting issues such as immigration, affirmative action, low-income programs, civil rights, etc.

If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criteria. See "Downloads Available" on conference website.

- \*7. The unit will have a program and/or complete an action addressing one of the Issue Priorities for 2016-2020. These are 1. Climate Justice; 2. Maternal and Child Health, 3. Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration; and 4. Economic Inequality. Find information at <a href="https://www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/general-conference/issuepriorities2016-20">www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/general-conference/issuepriorities2016-20</a>
- \*8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll.

- \*9. The unit will have one program from the <u>Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2017-2020</u>.

- \*10. The unit will contribute to all Five Channels of Mission Giving.
- \*11. The UMW Purpose will be recited at each general and/or circle meeting.
- \*12. The unit will contribute \$186.90 or more to the Legacy Fund in 2020.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend the district or conference annual meeting and report back to the unit about the event and what they experienced.
- 15. The unit will have at least one person joining the United Methodist Women's Action Network to receive and respond to legislative information at least three (3) times a year. #### This Time of Change

Dear UMW members and friends.

You have likely read recent media reports pointing to a split in the United Methodist Church. Many outlets grossly overstated what has happened, and I am writing to clarify.

Over the past several months, persons who have various leadership roles in our denomination and in some of the groups that have prepared their own separate plans for how the denomination should proceed in 2020 met with a mediator to see if it was possible to come together around a single plan. On Friday, Jan. 3, they announced that they had reached an agreement to move ahead through separation. Their proposal would allow traditionalist United Methodists to form a new Methodist/Wesleyan body. The protocol has provisions dealing with properties, pensions and sketches out some of the timing and process that would be required. I encourage you to read the <u>United Methodist News Service article</u> about it. At this stage, this agreement is a proposal. Actual legislation for the General Conference to consider will need to be drafted. It is a recommendation that has yet to be voted on or approved.

The current outline does not address United Methodist Women or the agencies of the church very much, except to say that, if the proposal is adopted, they and we would remain part of the UMC rather than the traditionalist denomination that could be formed if this approach is adopted by the General Conference. As you may know, United Methodist Women has been following the development of all the plans and at times providing input or response. Along with you, we know that there is urgent work for United Methodist Women to take on—supporting women, children and youth and marginalized persons and advocating for policies that are more just. Our commitment is to be a place where all the women who affirm the Purpose and want to work together in mission can belong. With this in view, the United Methodist Women Board of Directors has already made changes to our bylaws to ensure that women committed to this mission could continue to belong, regardless of whether they or their church or their Conference separates from the UMC.

As United Methodist Church examines next steps, United Methodist Women will continue to be a place where the needs of women and children are front and center. As we do, we encourage each of you to be informed of what is being considered and to offer leadership in your congregation and in the District and Conference. Times of dramatic change can bring new possibilities. They are also times to remain vigilant about our core commitments and our identity, both as a denomination and as an organization.

In this time of change, we encourage members to remain connected to each other, remain centered on the work we are called to do in the world and to remain watchful of information on next steps, confident that God is at work.
