

**Music Leaders:** Rev. Mark L. Barden and Catherine Ritch, back by popular request from our 2019 Annual Celebration and the many other times they have blessed us with uplifting music at past events. Mark is senior pastor at Central UMC in Shelby and a past Conference Director of Mission/Outreach and Director of Communication. Catherine is known as an author, composer, comedienne, entertainer, inspirational speaker, teacher, musician and missionary, but her favorite way to be acknowledged is "friend".

**Programming:** You'll enjoy favorite retreat elements, such as the gathering & praise singing and inspiring messages from our retreat leader. We will kick off our retreat with a dinner buffet at the Terrace and Lambuth Inn for lodging guests Friday, June 12<sup>th</sup>, and the retreat formally opens at 6:45 p.m. with Gathering and Praise. **Saturday morning will include break-out sessions for Bible study, prayer and meditation, spiritual walks around the Lake, a boat ride, trolley tour, and the World Methodist Museum tour.** 

Saturday evening after our worship service, we will be watching a movie—The Shack. As you may recall, this popular book was a part of our United Methodist Women's Reading Program several years ago. The movie will be shown in Stuart Auditorium.

Communion will be served during the Sunday morning session. We will need communion helpers so if you would like to help serve, contact your District President or me. Helpers will need to attend communion practice, which starts Saturday afternoon at 4:00 in Stuart Auditorium. The Sunday morning session will have a later start time to allow time for check-out and a relaxed breakfast, the last meal of the retreat. The retreat will conclude by noon Sunday.

# **Justice Today: Personal Reflections on White Privilege**




I grew up during the racial unrest of the 1960s and 70s. I am a career social worker who took courses and workshops on multiculturalism. I thought my life experiences provided me with a good grasp of race and racism. Although I understood racial inequities still existed in our society, like many other white folks, I harbored the illusion that we had made strides into a post-racial society.

That illusion was shattered 24 years ago when I entered a dating relationship with an African-American man, now my husband. Being followed in stores and trailed by police cars, encountering housing discrimination and being subjected to threatening stares, all became the norm. These were things I had never before experienced as a white female and would even now experience only when in the presence of my husband, a Black man. Without him around, I hold the white privilege of a store clerk's assumption that I will not shoplift. If I am stopped for speeding, I will probably get a warning or ticket but I will not be afraid that I could be shot and killed.

I discovered the harsh and ugly reality that a very different set of rules exists for persons of color. When I am with my husband, I need to abide by these rules. I was forced to recognize that I am steeped in unearned white privilege and, regardless of how much I want to escape this fact, it is a systemic reality interwoven into the fabric of our society.

It is very difficult for those of us who are white to understand this concept. I wasn't able to fully comprehend unearned white privilege until I was in situations where I experienced "guilt by association". Listening to those impacted by both blatant and subtle incidents of racism helped me to understand how we who are white turn a blind eye and inflict harm on our siblings of color.



We white folks have the power to change the racial injustices of white privilege, but we need to better understand how we benefit from this construct. I encourage you to read the book White Fragility by Robin DiAngelo. It may be painful, but it will open your eyes and hopefully allow you to see a better way for us to truly love all our sisters and brothers in Christ.

### Help Linda make UMCOR School Kits better so they "get there" sooner!

Conference Mission Coordinator for Education and Interpretation Linda Greer often says, "I don't make UMCOR kits; I make UMCOR kits better." What Linda means is that she receives many UMCOR School kits that aren't acceptable for use "as is". We can all help Linda get kits into the hands that need them by carefully following all instructions for buying and packing items in the kits.

Pay special attention to these items:

- Scissors must have very rounded tips. "Blunt" doesn't always mean they are rounded enough.
- One-subject notebooks. Composition books aren't usable.
- Erasers must be at least two inches long.
- Remove packaging \*except for crayons and notebook paper\*.



### Then and Now: Women Affirming and Supporting Women




Margaret Newton Van Cott was born in New York City on March 25, 1830. She joined the Methodist Church and felt a personal call to ministry. In a conversation with her husband and her pastor, she proclaimed, "I believe my tongue is my own, and I will use it when I please, where I please, and as I please." She gave her first public address in 1866.

In September 1868 she received an "exhorter's license" that allowed her to "exhort" and conduct prayer meetings, and in March 1869 she was given a local preacher's license. On her 50th birthday in 1880 it was said that she had traveled 143,417 miles and held 9,933 revival meetings. Van Cott served as an evangelist from 1866 until 1912.

Coincidentally, Van Cott received her local preacher's license on March 6, 1869, just a couple of weeks before the famously rainy meeting in Boston on March 23 that was the beginning of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, a predecessor organization of United Methodist Women. The Society was formed because women were tired of raising the money while men on mission boards decided how to spend the money.

United Methodist Women members have always advocated for women to have equal voice and vote. In 1888, five women were elected as delegates to General Conference, but they were seated in the balcony and allowed to observe only, with no voice or vote (January/February response, p. 6).

### Help Linda make <u>UMCOR Hygiene Kits</u> better so they "get there" sooner!

Conference Mission Coordinator for Education and Interpretation Linda Greer often says, "I don't make UMCOR kits; I make UMCOR kits better." What Linda means is that she receives many UMCOR Hygiene kits that aren't acceptable for use "as is". We can all help Linda get kits into the hands that need them by carefully following all instructions for buying and packing items in the kits. Please pay special attention to these items:

- Toothbrushes must be in single packs only. It doesn't work to cut a "two-pack" in half.
- Combs must have at least six inches of "teeth". Handles on combs are fine but shouldn't be counted in the six inches.
- Nail clippers only; no emery boards or metal nail files.
- No Ivory or Jergens soap b/c of high-moisture content which causes molding.
- Remove packaging \*except for toothbrushes and soap\*.

# Trea\$urer Tidbit\$

#### **Questions are GOOD!**

I am one happy Conference treasurer! In my article in the first 2020 Conference Gram, I reported on our 2019 WNCC Giving, including our Undesignated Giving of \$577,481. Recently one of our awesome District treasurers forwarded a question from a local unit, who had seen that number and wanted to know more about it.



They wrote: "We were looking at the financial report from the conference. We noticed a large sum for undesignated giving that goes to the national. \$577,481 is the amount. What is eventually done with this undesignated giving and who decides how the money is spent? Can we get an accounting of how the money is dispersed? Is there some report that breaks down the giving?"

### What an absolutely wonderful question!

**First, a brief primer on what makes up this category called <u>Undesignated Giving</u>. There are five channels of Undesignated Giving: Pledge, Special Mission Recognition, Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, and World Thank Offering. In addition, in Western NC Conference, the Walk for Mission is treated as Undesignated Giving.** 

### Why does Undesignated Giving matter?

<u>Undesignated Giving is the lifeblood of United Methodist Women Missions</u>. These are the funds that support our <u>National Mission Institutions</u> and our <u>International Missions</u>, as well as properties such as <u>Brooks-Howell Home</u> and <u>Church Center for the United Nations</u>. Giving within these channels allows the National Office to react quickly to emergency needs as well as form new projects or support existing ones that aid women and children.

United Methodist Women believe the determination of where the money goes is best left to those who know where it is needed the most. The people who are out there in touch with the real needs and who know what programs can best address those needs are the very people making the recommendations regarding where and how the funds are used. Who makes the final decisions? Your representatives on the United Methodist Women Board of Directors, members of United Methodist Women elected by you, with additional input from the members of the Program Advisory Group, and volunteer members of United Methodist Women elected by you.

**Finally, is there a report that breaks down the giving?** Absolutely! The best source is on the United Methodist Women website: <a href="www.unitedmethodistwomen.org">www.unitedmethodistwomen.org</a>, a website brimming with information about our missions, our goals, and the issues we support along with information about exactly which programs are funded and by how much. 
If you choose to purchase Mission u study books on your own, be aware that two of the study books are available **only** from UMW Mission Resources, while the third is **not** available at Mission Resources.






