Social Action Workshop: Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline

The statistics are staggering:

- Over the past 40 years, there has been a 500% increase in incarceration.
- African-American boys are three times as likely to be suspended than white boys.
- African-American girls are six times more likely to be suspended than their white peers.
- African-American children and youth make up 31% of school-based arrest and law enforcement referrals, although they only comprise 15% of total school enrollment.
- Native American/Alaskans make up 1% of school population yet account for 2% of school-based arrest and law enforcement referrals.

What sets the stage for these statistics begins before these children take their first step into school--from the moment of their birth. As United Methodist Women, we are called to dismantle racism. Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline identifies how systemic racism perpetuates the criminalization and mass incarceration of communities of color. As United Methodist Women, we are called to address the ways children and youth of color are criminalized and to step into action to reduce the racial disparities in school discipline.

To gain a better understanding of this call to social action, you are invited to the Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline program facilitated by Kathy FitzJefferies, Northern Piedmont District's UMW Social Action coordinator, and Carol Ann Moye of St. Matthew's United Methodist Church. This program is scheduled for Saturday, October 31, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon via Zoom.




Our Purpose



Other counties in our District could likely also use them. Units that are willing and able could pool money to buy a couple technological devices for donation.

If District officers didn't have term limits, we could just keep the same handful of willing volunteers forever...but our organization doesn't want or need the same group of women leading everything indefinitely. We value different perspectives, fresh ideas and the various spiritual gifts of each woman. Please prayerfully consider joining our team. It's not a "forever" commitment-remember, term limits! But United Methodist Women can only continue if Spirit-filled ladies step up to serve women, children and youth. It seems almost impossible that the fourth quarter of our 2020 UMW year has already begun. Although our third guarter was not at all as we hoped, giving has not stopped and we can celebrate the fact that we are still giving our mission money to support women, children and youth around the world.

Our total amount sent to our Conference Treasurer through the third quarter was \$52,435.29. Undesignated giving totaled \$44,823.27, which is applied to our 2020 Pledge to Mission of \$100,000. Remember that the UMW fiscal year ends December 1. Local unit treasurers will send all reports and money to me by that date.

The fourth quarter is historically our largest quarter for Undesignated Giving. As all units seek to complete the five channels of Undesignated Giving, be in prayer that the Northern Piedmont District can meet our annual Pledge to Mission. Encourage your unit to meet and exceed their Pledge this year.

Our District has contributed \$2,049.81 to the Legacy Fund through the third quarter. Of course, this amount does not include contributions made online directly to the national office. Let's keep up the good work and ensure United Methodist Women missions will survive to serve future generations.

We had a wonderful attendance at our virtual District Annual Celebration, and the meeting went smoothly. do look forward, however, to having next year's meeting in person where we can meet and greet each other as we have in the past. Many of our units may be small in number of members,

but we are all big in heart and in working for United Methodist Women. Thanks to all of you for the work you do!
