



### **SPOTLIGHT ON SPIRITUAL GROWTH:** You may have read in the September/October issue of *Response* magazine about the practice of the Moravian Love Feast in early Methodism, when clergy were not available to administer Holy Communion. Today, there is some differing thought about celebrating the sacrament virtually, as it has been the denomination's official interpretation that *The Holy* Mystery be practiced in-person and administered by clergy. As in the early church, The Love Feast offers a non-sacramental lay-led "opportunity for refreshment and renewal and Wesleyan expression of community." The early Love Feast or agape-meal, usually the sharing of bread and water, recalled the meals shared among Jesus and his followers. You will have an opportunity to share in a Love Feast with your Smoky Mountain District UMW sisters at the virtual Leadership Development Event on November 14<sup>th</sup>. I also encourage you to participate in the virtual Mission-U Spiritual Growth Study based on the book Finding Peace in an Anxious World, which takes place nightly October 26 – 29<sup>th</sup>. ### MISSION EDUCATION & INTERPRETATION: PRAYER REQUEST!!

I received an Email from Nara Melkonyan, Director of PROJECT APAGE, Dated September 27, 9:31am stating:

Early this morning, the Azerbaijan military has launched a missile and serial cross-border attack on Artsakh. The attacks were launched along the entire length of line of contact. The civilian settlements are being shelled in a plethora of cities and villages, including the capital of Stepanakert. Peaceful people are under bombardment, including children and elders. The entire responsibility of the situation lies with Azerbaijan's military-political leadership.

URGENT! one of the drones flew over Berdzor and was hit over the mountains overlooking the AGAPE Center and the Children's Home. WE ASK FOR YOUR THOUGHTS AND PRAYERS FOR THIS AWFUL CONFLICT TO RESOLVE QUICKLY AND PEACEFULLY! Nora

I ask that you share this information with your UMW and Congregation. Please put PROJECT AGAPE on your Prayer Requests that this conflict will end peacefully.

### A NOTE FROM YOUR DISTRICT TREASURER:

During the pandemic everything has changed the way we do things in our everyday lives, but as United Methodist Women we must not let it change our support of women, children, and youth around the world through Mission Giving. The first half of 2020 Smoky Mountain District has been able to give to Undesignated Giving \$16,120.33 (Five Channels of Giving), and the third quarter the amount was \$6,227.70. ### United Methodist Women Members Testify and Urge the EPA to Set Stronger National Air Quality Standards for Air Pollution

NEW YORK—Several members of United Methodist Women recently testified and urged the Environmental Protection Agency's proposal to set stronger national ambient air quality standards for air pollution. The testimony occurred during public hearings earlier this week. Read excerpts from the leaders' public testimony:

Elizabeth Chun Hye Lee, Executive for Economic and Environmental Justice at United Methodist Women (New York) "Ground level ozone pollution is created when harmful pollutants—like nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compounds—react in the presence of sunlight. These harmful pollutants are emitted from motor vehicles, power plants, chemical plants, refineries, factories, gas stations and paint. The climate crisis has only exacerbated ozone levels, as hotter temperatures have led to increased ozone pollution. Ozone is harmful to breathe and attacks our lung tissues.

"At the current levels, the health of children, youth, those 65 and older, those with existing lung conditions, and especially those who are also people of color and/or poor, will continue to be harmed."

### Rita L. Smith, President of North Central Jurisdiction United Methodist Women (Illinois)

"I support the recommendation of the American Lung Association. Ozone pollution created by harmful pollutants like nitrogen oxides are emitted from power plants and motor vehicles which produces 'smog' as we know it. This smog attacks lung tissue by chemically reacting with it causing

"My story is about my granddaughter, Imani, and all the other schoolage children with asthma. The best start to have clean air is by lobbying our car industry, in building more efficient cars. The transportation industry pollutes the air, causing my granddaughter to keep an asthma pump with her and one at school. While in elementary school, she had to keep at school in the office, but all Chicago Public Schools do not have nurses every day. Once, the school had to call for an ambulance to take her to the hospital. This day, I often wondered if this asthma attack was initiated from public transportation busses, the schoolbus or the cars while she was waiting for her bus. This is my reality: Polluted air causing my granddaughter and other school children causing missed day at school, thus hindering

### Christina Krost, Climate Justice Advocate for North Central Jurisdiction United Methodist Women (Illinois)

"I'm the spouse of a United Methodist clergyperson and move with my family to serve as our church leadership assigns. My daughter, Madeline, has had breathing difficulties in every town to which we've been appointed since 2011. In 2019, while living in southernmost Illinois, she contracted pneumonia twice in an 8-month span. This triggered visits to specialists several hours away, at great financial cost even with health insurance. And as I watch the rates of COVID infection climb in my community. I fear what might happen to her if she contracted this dangerous respiratory virus.

"I also know that studies have found that Black Americans, Indigenous people and people of color experience higher risks of harm, including premature death, from exposure to air pollution. Of the 20 million people living in counties with failing grades for ozone and particulate matter pollution, 14 million are people of color. 74 million people of color live in a county that received at least one failing grade. And climate change is exacerbating these problems."

### Phyllis Terwilliger, Climate Justice Advocate for Northeastern Jurisdiction United Methodist Women (Pennsylvania)

"At birth we take our first breath. A bellowing cry that announces: 'Here I am. ...' Dying of black lung from working in the anthracite mines near Frackville, Pennsylvania, my grandfather took his last breath. And, now, while breathing, we are testifying for the ozone national ambient air quality standards. EPA's proposal to keep the current, inadequate ozone standard is unacceptable. The science clearly shows that a stronger limit is needed to protect public health. I call on the EPA to follow the science and set stronger NAAQS for ozone pollution.

"I speak as a resident of the Susquehanna Watershed in York, Pennsylvania, a mother, a United Methodist Women climate justice advocate and an elementary teacher. The health effects of ozone pollution are numerous! The risk of hospital admissions of young children with asthma increased with chronic exposure to ozone pollution and children from low-income families were even more likely to need hospital admissions. Studies link lower birth weight and decreased lung function in newborns to ozone levels in their community."

### 2020 Conference Love Offering

### Then

Stalwart Women Refusing to Hear "No"

- 1869 Margaret Van Cott is granted a local preacher's license ME.
- 1876 Anna Oliver first woman to receive a Bachelor of Divinity degree from an American theological seminary.
- 1878 Anna Howard Shaw receives a Bachelor of Divinity degree.
- 1880 The General Conference of the ME refused to ordain Ann Howard Shaw and Anna Oliver and denies women the right to preachers' licenses. Anna Howard Shaw joins the MP and is ordained by its New York Annual Conference.
- 1884 The MP General Conference rules that Anna Howard Shaw's ordination was out of order.
- 1889 Ella Niswonger becomes first woman ordained in the UB.
- 1894 Sarah Dickey is ordained by the UB.
- 1910 The General Conference ME denies women laity rights.

### 1914-1918 First World War

- 1920 The local preacher's license, the first step to ordained ministry officially extended to women in the *Book of Discipline ME*.
- 1924 Women in the ME are given limited clergy rights.

### 1936-1945 World War II

- 1946 Women are denied ordination by the UB.1956 Women in the MC win full clergy rights.
- Maude Kristler Jensen is the first woman to be granted such rights.

1968 Merger forming the United Methodist Church
1972 United Methodist Women name adopted
1996 4,955 United Methodist Women ministers.

- The United Methodist Church has about 12,300 women ministers of a total of about 83,800. (2014)
- In the Western North Carolina Conference there are 356 women in ministry. Total appointed clergy in the Conference is 1,093.
- Of the eight District Superintendents, five are women.
- On January 15, the WNCC delegation endorsed a woman, Rev. Amy Coles as their episcopal nominee.




