Treasurer

I pray this newsletter finds all of you in good health and spirits. This has been a difficult year to say the least. While we have not been able to be together for our usual events, the work of United Methodist Women has continued. The missions we help support are struggling as we are, only their struggles have been magnified by the current issues surrounding Covid 19.

Our women in the Blue Ridge District have always engaged in generous giving. We see that in the amount that has been given thus far, despite circles and units that have not been able to meet and fund raisers that have had to be cancelled. You have given \$48, 728.60 thus far.

We are now in the last quarter of the year. Our District pledge is \$82,100. As you can see, meeting that pledge is unlikely, but hopefully we can get closer during this last quarter. Remember that the money given supports missions, and shortfalls for this year impact the help that can be given next year.

Please, if you have not already pledged, it is not too late. We have several ways in which you can still give--pledges, the World Thank Offering, Conference Love Offerings, Special Mission Recognitions, cards whether Gift to Mission or Gift in Memory, and Walk for Mission. You may wonder how you can do Walk for Mission, but that is the one fund raiser that can be done with using social distancing and, of course, wearing a mask. There can be other fund raisers like the No Bake, Bake Sale. A no bake, bake sale is where you obtain donors who pledge an amount of money for you to not bake an item. It may sound unusual, but it can be fun once the person understands the importance is on the donation versus the goodies.

You may send any money you wish to donate by check to your local unit treasurer, give on line at wnccumw.org where there is a button you can click in the upper right to do an electronic donation, or directly to me with the check addressed to Blue Ridge District UMW Treasurer. You can also give by sending your check to Nancy Reigel, WNCC Treasurer. Please make the check out to WNCC Treasurer. The addresses for myself and Nancy are at the end of this article. Please do not forget to write what the check is for in the memo section of the check.

I think we all can be proud of the money that has been given by your generosity and love for missions. Nothing can top a member of United Methodist Women when a job needs to be done or when we hear the call of the needy. I am so proud also of our local district treasurers who work extremely hard to ensure all money is appropriately accounted for and submitted as required. It is a bigger job than you might think, but all of them do it well.

At our Blue Ridge District Annual Celebration Virtual Call, I announced that we exceeded our pledge for 2019. Congratulations to all of you.

Social Justice

Hi, everyone. I hope your summer has been fun, relaxing and safe. It seems as though social justice has been at the forefront of the news almost every day. We can all make a difference. Let's pray and study our Bible (racism is contrary to the teachings of Jesus), review and try to live the UMW Charter for Racial Justice, educate ourselves about the candidates who are running for government office and VOTE. Here are some ways United Methodist Women is supporting and promoting social justice in September:

United Methodist Women is a sponsor of the Faith in Place 2020 Green Team Summit (September 13-17) as part of our work toward advancing climate justice and just energy for all. Hundreds of people of faith and expert speakers from across the country will explore justice-based solutions to the crises of climate change, racism, and COVID-19. The Summit's theme is "A Just Recovery." Visit faithinplace.org for more information.

The Office of Economic and Environmental Justice United Methodist Women reports that the number of COVID-19 cases continues to climb across the country, disproportionately impacting communities of color and asks that you sign this letter urging Congress to put a moratorium on utility shutoffs and provide people-focused federal relief and stimulus packages: https://p2a.co/33iJHcC.

Join the Thursdays in Black campaign. Make a pledge to work toward a world without rape and violence by joining the Thursdays in Black initiative launched by Ecumenical Women at the United Nations to end all sexual and gender-based violence. United Methodist Women is a founder of Ecumenical Women at the UN. We believe in the mutuality of mission and that by working with other faith-based groups that share our concerns we amplify putting an end to oppression, discrimination, injustice, abuse and violence in the world. Join the Harvest of Justice, a Program of the National Farm Worker Ministry linking United Methodist Women's Climate Justice and Living Wage Priorities. Learn and Act for Farm Workers and Climate Justice begins on Labor Day. Harvest of Justice 2020 brings attention to the impact of climate change on farm workers, the majority of whom are immigrants. With the past decade the hottest on record, it focuses on the rise in temperatures and how that pushes people to migrate, increases the intensity and occurrence of storms, requires more application of pesticides and means that people must labor in intense heat. It is farm worker bodies that literally bear the burden. Using NFWM resources you will learn about the impact of climate change on farm workers and specific ways to take action. Harvest of Justice 2020 runs from Labor Day to World Food Day (October 16), with adult and youth curricula available for United Methodist Women members to use anytime in the following year. This also coincides with the Season of Creation from September 1 to October 4, an ecumenical time to renew our relationship with our Creator and all creation through prayer and action for the earth. The curriculum can easily be adapted for a UMW virtual circle or local unit program. It includes 7 segments-an overview and focus on global migration, heat stress, water drought and wildfires, pesticides, natural disasters, and women and children. Climate change, environmental racism, COVID-19 and essential workers, food justice, racial justice all come together in the realities of the farm workers who harvest our food. Mission Education & Interpretation

There has been much concern about how the UMCOR kits and Project AGAPE clothes are to be collected. I now have the answer!

The following items are needed: School Kits & Hygiene Kits for UMCOR and new children's clothes sizes 2-14 for Project AGAPE. Cleaning Buckets & Project AGAPE Christmas Shoeboxes are **not** needed.

The cost of sending the kits is \$1 for each School Kit and \$2 for each Hygiene Kit (for purchasing toothpaste). There is no set amount for Project AGAPE. All donations are appreciated. Make check out to UMW, place in an envelope (do not put check or money in kits), and put UMCOR or AGAPE on the memo line.

The Fall 2020 collection site for most of our district will be at Groce United Methodist Church, 954 Tunnel Road, Asheville, NC. The drop-off dates are Monday – Thursday, September 28 – October 1 from 9:00am -5:00pm and Friday, October 2 from 9:00am – 12:30pm.

If you live in the eastern part of the district, you may want to drop your kits off at Salem United Methodist Church, 1206 Salem Church Road, Morganton, NC. Their drop-off dates are Tuesday, September 29 and Friday, October 2, from 11:00am – 6:00pm.

Please send me a list of what kits and/or clothes you donated and the approximate value so your donation is included in the year-end report. You can either send by email (<u>traceybhh@gmail.com</u>) or postal service (Tracey Owens, 249 Fleming Avenue, Marion, NC 28752).

Packing Instructions

- Please pack all items in the smallest box that is appropriate. Recommended box size is 16" X 12" X 12" since boxes of that size can be reused as part of a shipment.
- List the contents on the outside of the box.
- Also, pack the boxes as full and tight as possible. That prevents boxes from being crushed as they are stacked in the warehouse awaiting the sorting process.
- If at all possible, avoid using plastic bags, since they are easily torn and do not stack well on pallets.

Historian

Living History While Making History

Much is being said these days about racism and social justice. These are not new ideas to United Methodist Women (and our predecessors.) We have been "making history" for over a century by actions and statements.

☐ In the 1920's women of the Women's Missionary Society (MEC, S) initiated conversations with African-American women attempting to heal the social divide.
☐ In the 1930's , these women shared mailing lists with the "Women's Campaign against Lynching" to help secure wider participation in local protests.
☐ In the 1 940's The Woman's Division "Committee on Minority and Interracial Cooperation" was cochaired by white and African American women.
☐ In the 1950's the first Charter on Racial Policies was adopted; and by 1954, ratified by 5 Jurisdictions and over 75 Conference Woman's Societies.
☐ In the 1960's a second Charter was adopted; the Student Sit-in Movement supported; and Society members participated in the 1963 March on Washington.
☐ In 1978 the 3rd Charter was adopted and approved by the 1980 General Conference.
☐ In 2016 , the Charter for Racial Justice was updated and approved by General Conference for the whole church. Para. 3317.4 states, "Racism robs all human beings of their wholeness and is used as justification for social, economic and political exploitation."

In each decade Mission u, mission studies and the Reading Program have provided United Methodist Women insights beyond our personal experiences that challenged us to respond.

Community Outreach Unit Projects

One of the things I like most about the United Methodist Church and our United Methodist Women is our connectedness. Recently I was on a Zoom conference call with one of the missionaries to Brazil, who was actually calling from Austin, Texas. There were 53 participants on the call, and I did not look at the whole list. But the next day I received an e-mail from Julie Elmore, a clergy woman now in Michigan, who previously served at Community United Methodist Church in Nome, Alaska. She had recognized my name on the list. (We had connected when she was in Nome because my UMW circle sends layettes every year to the UMW in Nome. The UMW there gives a new layette wrapped with a pink or a blue ribbon with a blessing to every baby born in the hospital in Nome.) I e-mailed back to Julie that we are right now collecting baby items for the layettes, but that I had not been able to talk with anyone in Nome because the church there is still closed. Julie asked if it was ok to give my phone number to a UMW member she knows in Nome. Certainly!

The very next day Mary Reader, a Nome UMW, called to update their needs. We talked for a good 30 minutes! Mary said that for a few years pregnant women were being flown to Anchorage for delivery, but now once again the hospital in Nome is delivering more babies, serving not just Nome itself, but the surrounding 9 villages, only two of which even have roads to Nome. The nurses at the hospital told Mary that their supply of layettes is getting low. There were 65 babies born there in 2019, and already 75 in 2020. The greatest need right now is for receiving blankets and sleepers. The nurses said that for some new mothers, the UMW layettes are the only thing they have to take their babies home.

Our circle publicizes the layette project for our whole church to participate. We will be having a drive-by drop off event at the church in October. **Note: "Other" may also include items with asterisks (*).

The purpose of promoting a Mission Today Unit is to:

Energize United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action. Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes. Encourage the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a Unit?

A unit is any organized group of United Methodist Women within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles, which periodically get together for a unit meeting.

How Do We Become a Mission Today Unit?

In order to be recognized as a Mission Today Unit, (Gold, Silver or Bronze) UMW units must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated above. Activities conducted between January 1-December 31, 2020, will be recognized at annual meetings in 2021. This is an ongoing program, so strive to become a Mission Today Unit!

CRITERIA:

*1. The Unit will make a Pledge to Mission.

- *2. The unit will use the Prayer Calendar at each general meeting or circle meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth. A new Prayer Calendar is printed each year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- *3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year. A new Program Book is printed every year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- *4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit attend the conference Mission u or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study, Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)
- *5. The unit will have at least two members subscribing to *response* (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members; Local unit subscription may count as one.) Order information is printed at bottom of page 2. \$24.00 for a one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription); \$20 for a one-year digital only subscription.
- *6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. Possibilities are:
 - a. Have members read and discuss books and articles about other races and cultures;
 - b. Sponsor or attend an interethnic event between two or more units;
 - c. Intentionally recruit women of other ethnic groups to be members and officers of the unit;
 - d. Use the Resources for Racial Justice Available on our conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources."
 - e. Write to elected representatives to support legislation affecting issues such as immigration, affirmative action, low-income programs, civil rights, etc.

If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criteria. See "Downloads Available" on conference website.

- *7. The unit will have a program and/or complete an action addressing one of the Issue Priorities for 2016-2020. These are 1. Climate Justice; 2. Maternal and Child Health, 3. Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration; and 4. Economic Inequality. Find information at www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/generalconference/issuepriorities2016-20
- *8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll.

- *9. The unit will have one program from the <u>Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2017-2020</u>. Available at <u>www.Cokesbury.com</u> for \$3.99 plus tax and shipping.
- *10. The unit will contribute to all Five Channels of Mission Giving.
- *11. The UMW Purpose will be recited at each general and/or circle meeting.
- *12. The unit will contribute \$186.90 or more to the Legacy Fund in 2020.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced. Virtual participation qualifies as attending.
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend the district or conference annual meeting and report back to the unit about the event and what they experienced. Virtual participation qualifies.
- 15. The unit will have at least one person joining the United Methodist Women's Action Network to receive and respond legislative information at least three (3) times a year. To join, contact the United Methodist Women Washington Office, 100 Maryland Avenue NE, Room 100, Washington, DC 20002. Phone #: 202-488-5660 or Visit: www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/action Attach the issue and action that was taken to Mission Today report.
- 16. Members will correspond with five persons listed in the Prayer Calendar at least once a year.
- 17. The unit will co-sponsor, with the local church, a Children's Sabbath. (This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children.) The United Methodist Women National Office and the Council of Bishops support this effort. Children's Sabbath materials are on our national website: www.unitedmethodistwomen.org Type "Children's Sabbath" in the search box.
- 18. Each unit or circle meeting will include a "**response** Moment" where an item from **response** magazine will be lifted up as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. The unit will sponsor one teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one conference event during the year.
- 20. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend a district Prayer Breakfast, district Day Apart, conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special district or conference event other than Ubuntu Day. Virtual participation in any of these events qualify as attending.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will participate in an Ubuntu Day Event. Units may develop their own UBUNTU event in their communities.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will complete Plan 1 of the Reading Program and give a report to the unit on one of the books read.
- 23. The unit will invite a district or conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings during the year and/or for their United Methodist Women's Sunday. This Qualifies as a Local Unit Visit (LUV).
- 24. The unit will add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18 to 39) circle during the year, or one new teen member (ages 12 to 17) or one new young woman member (ages 18 to 39) during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund
- 26. The 2020 Conference Financial Goal is: To increase unit pledge giving by at least \$5.00 per member.

 The unit will help accomplish the goal by increasing giving in this channel by at least \$5.00 per member over 2019.
- 27. Each unit will be responsible for supporting at least one local mission project and participate in one Conference Hands-on Mission Project during the year. The local project should be listed on your Mission Today report.
