

Importance of Prayer as We Prepare for Our Prayer Breakfast, Sarah Lee, VP

As we are preparing for our prayer breakfast that will be happening soon, I want to share some ideas for helping us have a consistent prayer life.

Mark 1:35 says of Jesus, "In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed."

Jesus needed to take quiet moments alone to pray just as we do. Do you ever get distracted when you pray? It's different for everyone, but here are a few things that can help us keep a consistent prayer life:

- 1. **Designate a Prayer Place**: It could be the blue chair, or it could be the left side of your cozy sofa, your kitchen table or your back-porch swing. Having a consistent place to pray takes some of the guesswork out of the process. You may have to test out a few spots before finding one that feels right for you.
- 2. <u>Find a Dedicated Time</u>: Early mornings may work for you because they're the only time you may be alone. Or it might be your lunch break, right before bed or after the kids leave for school in the mornings.
- 3. <u>Start with Gratitude</u>: It could be something simple, such as giving thanks for the warm blanket around you or the hot cup of coffee in your hands, but I've found that if we start there, the gratitude begins to flow to every area of my life.
- 4. <u>Candidly Confess</u>: Lift the burdens weighing you down by confessing when you have fallen short, in big ways or small. Perhaps you inadvertently spoke harshly to a loved one or have let your selfish wants overpower the desire to help others.
- 5. <u>Humbly Ask</u>: Although God knows all and sees all, ask Him humbly for what is important to you, whether to heal your sick friend, watch over a child, or guide important decisions in your life. Even though God knows the desires of our hearts, it pleases Him when we pray and ask humbly & sincerely for His help.
- 6. Accept God's Will Over Your Own: This might be the hardest part, especially if you're a control freak. Leaving our humble requests at the feet of our Lord allows us to relinquish control and let God's plan unfold. Our heavenly Father wants good gifts for us, as illustrated in Luke 11:11, "Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish?" (NRSV) As challenging as it can be, let's trust that God wants what is best for us.
- 7. <u>Let Go and Live Free</u>: We can feel so free after our prayer time. We can face the day knowing we have placed our cares and struggles at God's feet, mindful He is with us throughout the day and guiding our thoughts and decisions.

Do we have perfect attendance every day in our prayer chairs? No, but it's hard to walk by it in the morning without the beckoning call to sit a spell in the presence of God. Some mornings, our visits with God are short, and other days they're lengthier, but we're always glad we have them.

Dear heavenly Father, please stir a desire in us to visit with You each day. Help us stay focused in our prayer times and avoid the daily distractions during our visits with You. Help us find the

words to talk with You as a friend, and at the same time, see the awe and majesty of being able to sit in Your presence in prayer. In Jesus' Name, Amen

Let's all pray for our blessings as we are recovering from many effects of the pandemic. May each of you have a blessed Easter and I look forward to seeing you on our Zoom prayer breakfast meeting(bring your own breakfast and meet together at your church) and hopefully we can meet in person real soon as we walk for missions in 5 different areas this year!!

\$\$\$ Notes from the Treasurer

Our Q1 remittance has been sent to the Western North Carolina Conference (WNCC) UMW. We paid \$9,966.54 toward our Pledge to Mission so far, which is 19%. This is down from prior years at this point, but we are still dealing with COVID, so this is not unexpected. Year-to-date Mission giving paid to WNCC UMW, including designated gifts is \$11,386.54. Thank you Uwharrie District on behalf of all the women, youth and children you are helping!

Although many units are still not meeting, anyone can give on-line on the WNCC UMW website. It can be found on the very top line on the Home Page "GIVE NOW" or at https://wnccumw.org/online-mission-giving/. These online gifts WILL be credited back to your Unit. Or, anyone can send a check directly to me towards their Unit's giving. Just note your Unit on your check. (Of course, if your unit is meeting, you can still give through the normal quarterly remittance process.)

Something new this year is that ALL 5 Channels of Unesignated Giving plus Walk for Missions funds will count towards a Unit's pledge. This has always been the case for Districts, but not for Local Units in many districts, including Uwharrie. Based on NationaTreasurer training we received and subsequent review with Conference, this will be consistently applied starting this year.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMENTS

Recently, our Uwharrie District had our Mission Study on one of our key Social Action focuses: Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline. This excellent presentation encompassed many issues affecting our schools and the higher percentage of youth of color compared to white youth being suspended, dropping out, or referred to the juvenile court system and jailed. Many of us have not been totally aware of these imbedded discriminatory practices affecting our schools and judicial systems.

One of our UMW goals should be to educate ourselves and become more sensitive and informed. Attending workshops and listening to UMW webinars online is one way. Another important way is for us to read. Our Mission Study urged us to read 3 books: Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools (Morris), The New Jim Crow (Alexander), and Caste (Wilkerson). Our UMW Reading Program last year and this year also lists books which deal with such social issues, like For Such A Time as This ((Risher), The Hate You Give (Thomas), Anxious to Talk About It (Helsel), and Who Lynched Willie Earle? (Willimon), among others.

So let's read, study and educate ourselves, and share ideas with others in love!



Mission Today 2021 - Reduced criteria due to COVID-19 **Western North Carolina Conference** MAKE A DIFFERENCE! Become a Mission Today Unit!!

NEW IN 2020 and continuing in 2021:

Mission Today Gold - Complete 10 criteria: 6 with asterisks (*) and 4 other.** Mission Today Silver - Complete 8 criteria: 4 with asterisks (*) and 4 other.** Mission Today Bronze - Complete 6 criteria: 4 with asterisks (*) and 2 other.** **Note: "Other" may also include items with asterisks (*).

The purpose of promoting a Mission Today Unit is to:

Energize United Methodist Women to be more involved in mission through prayer, study and action. Increase contacts between units and mission personnel and mission projects so the United Methodist Women understand where their money goes. Encourage the use of mission resources through United Methodist Women. Expand concepts of mission, including social justice as mission.

What is a Unit?

A unit is any organized group of United Methodist Women within a church or district. Some units are composed of several circles, which periodically get together for a unit meeting.

How Do We Become a Mission Today Unit?

In order to be recognized as a Mission Today Unit, (Gold, Silver or Bronze) UMW units must complete a number of the following criteria as indicated above. Activities conducted between January 1-December 31, 2021, will be recognized at annual meetings in 2022. This is an ongoing program, so strive to become a Mission Today Unit!

CRITERIA:

- *1. The Unit will make a Pledge to Mission.
- *2. The unit will use the Prayer Calendar at each general meeting or circle meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth. A new Prayer Calendar is printed annually and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center. Prayer Calendar entries are posted on our UMW website and FaceBook page.
- *3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year. A new Program Book is printed every year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.
- *4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit attend all 4 sessions of the virtual conference Mission u or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study, Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)
- *5. The unit will have at least two members subscribing to response (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members; Local unit subscription may count as one.) Order information is printed at bottom of page 2. \$24.00 for a one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription); \$20 for a one-year digital only subscription.
- *6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. Possibilities are:
 - Have members read and discuss books and articles about other races and cultures;
 - b. Sponsor or attend an interethnic event between two or more units;
 - c. Intentionally recruit women of other ethnic groups to be members and officers of the unit;
 - d. Use the Resources for Racial Justice Available on our conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources."
 - e. Write to elected representatives to support legislation affecting issues such as immigration, affirmative action, low-income programs, civil rights, etc.

If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criteria. See "Downloads Available" on conference website.

- *7. The unit will have a program and/or complete an action addressing one of the Issue Priorities for 2021-2024. These are 1. Climate Justice; and 2. Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration. You may find information at www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/focus-issues.
- *8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll.

- *9. The unit will have one program from the <u>Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2017-2020</u>.

- *10. The unit will contribute to all Five Channels of Mission Giving.
- *11. The UMW Purpose will be recited at each general and/or circle meeting, including virtual meetings.
- *12. The unit will contribute \$186.90 or more to the Legacy Fund in 2021.
- 13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced. Virtual participation qualifies as attending.,
- 14. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend the district or conference annual meeting and report back to the unit about the event and what they experienced. Virtual participation qualifies.
- 15. The unit will have at least one person joining the United Methodist Women's Action Network to receive and respond to legislative information at least three (3) times a year. - 16. Members will correspond with five persons listed in the Prayer Calendar at least once a year.
- 17. The unit will co-sponsor, with the local church, a Children's Sabbath. (This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children.) The United Methodist Women National Office and the Council of Bishops support this effort. Children's Sabbath materials are on our national website: www.unitedmethodistwomen.org Type "Children's Sabbath" in the search box.
- 18. Each unit or circle meeting will include a "*response* Moment" where an item from *response* magazine will be lifted up as a way to tell the mission story.
- 19. The unit will sponsor one teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one conference event during the year.
- 20. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend a district Prayer Breakfast, district Day Apart, conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special district or conference event other than Ubuntu Day. Virtual participation in any of these events qualify as attending.
- 21. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will participate in an Ubuntu Day Event. Units may develop their own UBUNTU event in their communities.
- 22. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will complete Plan 1 of the Reading Program and give a report to the unit on one of the books read. Type "Reading Program" in search box on website.
- 23. The unit will invite a district or conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings during the year and/or for their United Methodist Women's Sunday. May be Virtual This Qualifies as a Local Unit Visit (LUV).
- 24. The unit will add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18 to 39) circle during the year, or one new teen member (ages 12 to 17) or one new young woman member (ages 18 to 39) during the year.
- 25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund
- 26. The 2021 Conference Financial Goal is: Each unit will make at least one Gift to Mission, of at least \$5.00, using any cards they have, in honor of one person in Mission listed in either the **Prayer Calendar** or **response** magazine article. The unit will help accomplish the goal by sending at least one Gift to Mission in 2021 as stated above.
- 27. Each unit will be responsible for supporting at least one local mission project and participate in one Conference Hands-on Mission Project during the year. The local project should be listed on your Mission Today report.
