MISSION EDUCATION & INTERPRETATION:
MISSION TODAY! The new MISSION TODAY 2021 is out with reduced criteria due to Covid-19. #1 Criteria is: THE UNIT WILL MAKE A PLEDGE TO MISSION. If your unit hasn't made a Pledge, please let our District Treasurer, Judy Bromley, know what your pledge is from your unit.
This year Mission u will be Virtual on July 15-18. Information will be coming shortly from the UMW Conference. The 2 Studies will be: "Pushout" - The Criminalization of Black Girls in School. The other Study will be "Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom" - Living into the Church's Moral Witness through Radical Discipleship. You may purchase these books from your local Bookstore or Amazon. Also, your Public Library may carry these books.
This past week I attended a Virtual Meeting about Sager Brown in Baldwin, LA, so I will tell you a little history about Sager Brown. Sager-Brown rose from the ashes of the Civil War in 1867, serving as an orphanage for African-American children. Known as "The Orphan-Home," Sager-Brown developed into an elite school for African-Americans, teaching cooking, farming, and basic literacy. As the school began to struggle financially, Dr. Godman, a Methodist missionary, gathered several of the young ladies and began a tour of the northern states as "Jubilee Singers." This group so impressed Mrs. Sager and Mrs. Brown that they purchased the school and they ran it a few years and gave it to what is now the United Methodist Women in 1921. The school was renamed Sager-Brown Orphanage and Godman School, and continued operating until the doors were closed in 1978.
The property was put on the market and never sold. Hurricane Andrew hit that area in 1992 and caused widespread property damage in the area. The property is five feet above sea level. The property suffered little damage and the General Board of Global Ministries and UMCOR recognized that the property was a place to coordinate UMCOR relief efforts, and it became a relief center. Volunteers came and did repairs in the community and relief efforts went on for 3 years. UMCOR realized a need for a permanent facility to respond to natural disasters. So a 48,000 sq. ft. Depot was built in 1995. UMCOR owns the Depot (where our relief kits are sent), but the United Methodist women owns the property (25 acres) that it sits on and 12 buildings.
My husband and I were long term volunteers at Sager-Brown for 18 months over a 3 year period. While we were there, there was always an ongoing maintenance of the buildings and grounds. I remember on two different occasions that the Women's Division Treasurer came and made inspections of the property.
