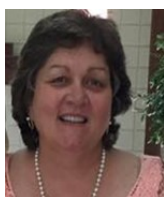
Social Issue Study—Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools

Time to hit Reset?



Yes, **2020 took us for a ride.** What began as a “normal” year for giving suddenly took a sharp downturn. First-quarter Mission Giving came in at an expected level...then the bottom fell out. Yes, giving did continue. You—Western NC UMW members—remained faithful in your giving, but the scarcity of Local, District, and Conference gatherings took a toll. Amazingly, because of our careful stewardship of funds, bolstered by the sacrificial giving that did come in, **we were able to meet our 2020 Pledge and receive recognition from the National Office.**



Now our outlook is so much brighter. We are seeing glimmers of in-person gatherings on our planning calendars. Time to grab onto this opportunity with zeal while incorporating some of the new strategies and tactics we developed in overcoming recent challenges.

Looking at 2020 through the lens of a treasurer, what did we learn, what did we gain?

Clearly, many of us are more comfortable giving “in person” at gatherings, whether they are Circle or Unit meetings, District or Conference events. But as the year unfolded, we saw many members grow increasingly comfortable giving online. Some members enjoyed the ease of giving without the need to write a check and put it in the mail. We saw that online giving was safe and totally secure. Our online donations were accurately credited in terms of the giver’s designation (one of the Five Channels of Giving, Prayer & Self-Denial, the Legacy Fund, etc.) and membership (Local Unit and/or District).

We learned that many meetings, especially those to plan or conduct “business” can be successfully carried out remotely, thus reducing the time, stress, and costs associated with travel. By taking advantage of these less expensive yet still effective options, we were able to send more funds to Mission, our primary goal, clearly a GAIN for Mission.



I close by sharing a hope that although this past year has forced many changes on us, we will come out of it stronger and more resilient, taking full advantage of new opportunities while reembracing those past traditions that have sustained us from our beginning.

What has changed: how the certificates are delivered to you



In the past, certificates were generated by the fulfillment house that handled the pins and were shipped with the pins. This has changed. Starting earlier this year, District treasurers became responsible for printing and mailing these certificates. **This means the certificates will arrive separate from the pins.** The pins and certificates have not changed, only the process of getting them to you. We hope this information minimizes any confusion.

UMW Climate Justice

United Methodist Women members representing the Blue Ridge and Yadkin Valley Districts and the Western North Carolina Conference were among the more than 300 members and other interested parties who participated in 80 meetings with their elected officials (or a representative of the official) in almost 40 states across the nation concerning climate justice.

The Zoom meeting with Harrison Walker (Sen. Thom Tillis' Legislative Correspondent) and the conference call with John McDonaldson (Sen. Richard Burr's

Energy, Environment, and Transportation Senior Representative) were concerted efforts to present scientific evidence, as well as personal anecdotes, in the hope that Senators Tillis and Burr will commit to legislation that would reduce and eventually eliminate harmful practices that have disastrous effects on our planet and its inhabitants.

This campaign is just the beginning of what promises to be an uphill journey with many hurdles to overcome. Nonetheless, we are not without resources, and history has proven we are up to the challenge.

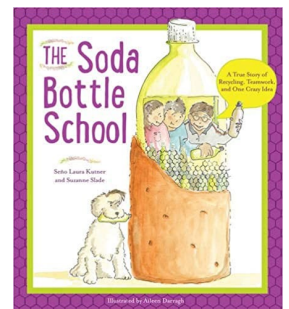

Here's hoping all of you are still in "reading mode" and keeping healthy and safe from the COVID-19 virus. I want to remind you about a book I've highlighted before from the United Methodist Women Reading Program 2020 list called, "So You Want to Talk About Race?" by Ljeoma Oluo. It is a Bonus Book, so it counts as two books in the Social Action category. I have read this book, and it is one that makes you think about all the attitudes about race in our country, and how they impact our interactions.



As described in the March/April 2021 issue of [response](#) magazine, this book was used as a virtual book study by four UMW members in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. The book study began the first week with a Bible study on Exodus 1:6-14. The participants were divided into four groups: Pharaoh, slave masters, Egyptians, and Israelites. Each group was asked to respond to three questions:

- 1: How do you view yourself in the community?
- 2: How do others view you in the community?
- 3: What are your fears?

There is also a free online class on the book, which you can access from United Methodist Women. The course uses the Bridge learning app, so you will need to create a Bridge account to access the class. 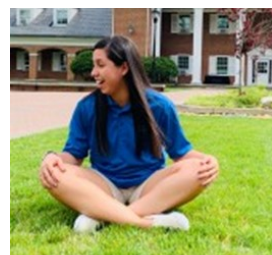

Growing up, I was deeply involved with my community and I loved helping people. I especially loved being a part of The United Methodist Church family. I enjoyed volunteering, being a part of a youth group, and going on mission trips. Being so involved at church made me realize how passionate I was about helping others. 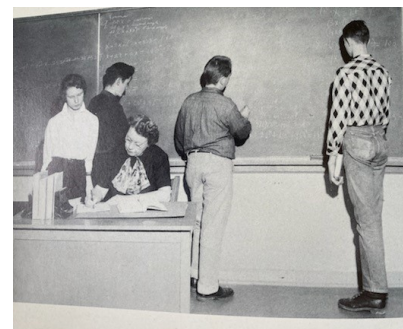

Spotlight on the Fannie Mit Case Scholarship

Yajaira received support from the Fannie Mit Case Scholarship, part of our [WNCC UMW Scholarship Program](#). This scholarship fund was established in 1962 after Mrs. Case's death. Her husband had died two years earlier in a car wreck coming home from the Copperhill Golf Course. They had no children, so her estate sold all of their belongings after Mrs. Case died, and the proceeds were used to start the scholarship.



Mrs. Case and her husband were members at Murphy First UMC. Mrs. Case taught math at Murphy High School for many years. According to one yearbook, "The aim of her classes is to develop accuracy and speed in computation, to teach the principles of arithmetic and algebra and the application of these principles, to inspire students with aptitude in this field to continue the study of mathematics, and to prepare them for such courses.



She also strives to help her students develop those character and personality traits attributed to a real person. Mrs. Fannie Mitt Case has taught 26 years at various places such as Albemarle, Bryson City, and Waynesville, among others. She got her A.B. degree at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina."

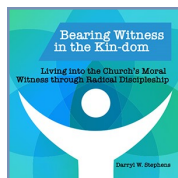
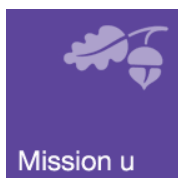
