# Virtual Annual Celebration Hands-On Project

Even though we are not meeting in person, I encourage you to participate in our hands-on projects. For Conference Annual Celebration, we are asking for three items for Project AGAPE:

New blankets - any size

New children's winter clothing - sizes 2-14, especially boys' clothing

New children's shoes – all sizes: Toddler 3-10; Little Kids 10.5-13.5 & 1-3; Big Kids 3.5-7

Donors are asked to pack blankets and clothing in separate corrugated boxes and label the boxes on the outside. Shoes can be left in their original box if available; if not, pack new shoes in corrugated boxes. If you have several shoe boxes, put them together in a large, corrugated box.

Units are to report to your District Mission Education & Interpretation Coordinator (ME&I) the estimated value (rounded to nearest dollar) of items sent. All checks for Project AGAPE should be made to UMW with "Project AGAPE" on the memo line and sent to your District Treasurer.

### Mid-Year Check-in...How Are We Doing?

Let's take stock of our current financial support of our United Methodist Women Missions. We will focus on Undesignated Mission Giving, since this is the giving that most directly impacts those projects selected for funding by our member-populated <u>Board of Directors and Program Advisory Group</u> (including our Conference PAG member Sherry Sink).

#### What does Undesignated Mission Giving fund?

- District and Conference Gatherings, such as the upcoming Annual Celebrations
- District newsletters and the Conference Gram
- All other member-nurturing activities and materials
- Our Conference Pledge made to our National Organization—the funds that fuel <u>United Methodist Women missions</u> around the world.

Put another way, here is our financial equation:

**Undesignated Giving** 

A&MD Amount

**Funds available for Mission** 

Let's look at the two parts on the left side of our equation:

- The amount received in Undesignated Giving at the halfway point in 2021 is running 13% behind where we were this time last year in giving from the eight districts. Giving is also down in our love offerings.
- Administrative and Membership Development costs continue to run under budget, and your District and Conference teams are working hard to keep them low and still provide you with quality opportunities for "Growth and Development." Call it "Nurturing."

What does this mean? It means that we are still on a path of supporting Missions, but we have challenges as we work to maintain that support at our historical levels. Can it be done? Yes, of course. We just need to find new ways of telling compelling stories of Mission that inspire our current and potential members to be "in Mission" through Mission Giving. Think about it. This starts with you, me, us. Do you know the status of your own unit's giving? That is a good start.

#### Now, on a personal note:

For the past six years, I have had the honor and privilege of being your Conference Treasurer. Over this time, many of you have included notes of support and encouragement with your checks. Each one has been deeply meaningful and much appreciated. You have indeed created a creative and supportive fellowship. Thank you all for that and this opportunity to serve.

#### From the Historian's Quill

The decision to feature the <u>WNCC UMW Scholarship Program</u> as a Conference Gram series was strictly personal. I realized that I didn't know anything about the scholarships given, and I questioned if I was the only one. I also found out that the scholarship recipients I interviewed for this series often did not know which scholarships they had received or about those who endowed these scholarships. In every case I was told how nice the scholarship committee was, how the interviews were different they from any other interview they had for a scholarship, how much they appreciated the United Methodist Women and the difference they made in their life. They also told me how it changed their opinion of the UMW in their own church.

I grew up at Centenary UMC, Greensboro with the Herbins and Motleys, and even as a child, I knew they were special people. They were friends of my family, and Wilhelmina Herbin seemed to always have a big old smile on her face. I always admired the way she took care of her mother. I remember going to her house when I was young and how she fixed my dolls. I had planned to go into some type of church ministry after high school in 1969, and Wilhelmina tried to get me to go to Greensboro College. But now, because of the WNCC UMW Scholarship Program, I truly realize what special people the Herbins and Motleys were. They are just a few of the United Methodist Women (and men) out there making a difference in the life of women, children, and youth around the world.

The Herbin-Motley Scholarship Fund was first established in 1981 by Mrs. Wilhelmina M. Herbin and Mr. Richard W. Herbin as the Greensboro District UMW Motley Scholarship Fund in memory of Mrs. L.E. Motley, mother of Mrs. Herbin. The name of the fund was changed in 1984 to the Herbin-Motley Scholarship Fund to honor past Greensboro District president Mrs. Herbin and her husband. Preference is given to applicants studying business administration, education, music, social studies, etc. This scholarship is for students planning to attend Greensboro College or Bennett College. Here's the story of just one student who received the Herbin-Motley Scholarship.

Marcinia Johnson is a rising senior at Bennett College and a member of St. Mark's UMC in Charlotte. She was selected as a 2021 OZY Genius Award Winner for her "Anti-gentrification low-income homes for seniors" initiative. This prestigious award is given to ten students each year and includes \$10,000 and a mentor to help bring their initiative to life. Previous award winners include National Youth Poet Laureate Amanda Gorman. Marcinia also serves as a Lina H. McCord intern for the Black College



In her award profile, Marcinia stated, "When I was a child, my family struggled to make ends meet. We moved from place to place and often made a home with welcoming strangers willing to take us in. The instability made navigating high school difficult. Ultimately, it was my church family who helped me through my situation. Through their involvement, I learned of Bennett College and was able to enroll there."

It has been my honor to serve you as the historian of WNCC UMW for the last four years.

## Are YOU a Voting Delegate for Conference Annual Celebration?



When you register online to participate in the <u>2021 Virtual Annual Celebration</u>, you will be asked if you are a voting delegate. We want all eligible delegates to answer yes! Most confusion about eligibility arises with local unit members and district officers. Check with your local unit to see who is attending the online business session and be sure that someone has registered as a voting delegate. (See information below regarding how many delegates a unit may have.) If you are the president of your local unit, you may designate who your voting delegate(s) will be (just make sure they register that way).

According to our conference standing rules (page 24), you are a voting delegate IF you are:

- representing your local unit which has a membership of 50 members or fewer. If your unit
  has more than 50 members, there is one additional voting delegate for each additional 50
  members. (Example: a unit of 150 members would have three voting delegates.)
  Typically, the president of the local unit would be the voting delegate if she plans to
  attend.
- a district officer or a **chairperson** of a district committee. **Members** of the nominating committee (or other district committees) are not voting delegates **unless** they happen to be representing their local unit.)





Scholarship applications must be received by October 1st in order to be considered. Scholarship recipients will be notified in time to register at the early bird rate (by November 30th).
- The Southeastern Jurisdiction United Methodist Women will award one \$500 scholarship for Assembly 2022 to someone from our conference. The recipient of the SEJ scholarship will be chosen from among the persons submitting applications for our WNCC scholarships shown above.
