Letting Your Leaves Fall

Just as the trees don't stubbornly hold on to their dead leaves, so we shouldn't hold on to any unnecessary weight in our lives. When we long to enter a new season, the old can easily inhibit the new if we allow it. God's Word reminds us to:

Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. Ephesians 4:31,32 (NIV)

To get rid of negativity in our lives, we must first identify it. How can we do this?

- » By reading God's Word.
- » By allowing His Spirit to show us the necessary heart changes we need.
- » By being willing to shun practices such as bitterness and anger.
- » By asking God to help us let go of the guilt from the past.

\$\$\$ Notes from the Treasurer

Well, I thought this would be my last year as District Treasurer, but apparently God had a different plan than I did. So, I will be staying on for one more year.

Our Q3 remittance was sent to Conference in early September. Year-to-date, we have paid \$28,540.97 against our \$51,500 Pledge to Mission so far, which is 55%. This is down from prior years at this point, but the pandemic is not over yet, so this is no surprise. And, some units still haven't resumed meeting yet. Year-to-date Mission giving paid to Western North Carolina Conference, including designated gifts is \$33,005.47. We have also paid \$1053.91 to National for Legacy Fund. Uwharrie District IS making a significant, positive impact for women, youth and children locally and around the world!

If your unit is still not meeting in person, you can give on-line on the WNCC UMW website. Click on the "GIVE NOW" link at the top line on the Home Page or use https://wnccumw.org/online-mission-giving/. These online gifts WILL be credited back to your Unit. Or, anyone can send a check directly to me towards their Unit's giving. Just note your Unit on your check. (Of course, if your unit is meeting, you can still give through the normal quarterly remittance process.)

Also, remember that all 5 Channels count towards your Unit's Pledge. So, Special Mission Recognition, Gifts to Mission, Gifts in Memory, World Thank Offering and even Walk for Missions donations count. If you need GTM/GIM cards, let me know.

CLIMATE INJUSTICE DURING STORMS

We have had historic flooding along the Gulf Coast this year, and it seems that flooding may be our future, along with a loss of livable land on the coast. After Katrina, New Orleans greatly improved its levee system which did indeed work this year to protect the city from horrible flooding. Other coastal places in Louisiana are often not protected by levees. Power, population and politics determine who gets levees.

East of New Orleans, the coastal areas are not usually protected by levees and are occupied by many people living below the poverty line. Flooding can be severe. Many poor people can't afford to put their houses on stilts as the ocean encroaches on their land, or rebuild quickly if they are flooded, even with FEMA's help. These poorer people often can't evacuate the area when a hurricane is approaching because they don't have transportation, or if they can get out, they can't pay for motel bills once they get to a safer place. So they stay put or go to a shelter.

Hurricane Ida's strong winds up to 150 mph destroyed electric poles, lines, and in some places the whole electrical grid in these poorer areas. Outside of New Orleans and larger cities, power has been very slow to return, and it may be weeks more. Many of the poorer people can't afford generators, and those who do were paying \$80 a day for fuel to protect themselves from the depressive heat. Outlying clinics were hit hard, and many area schools have had to close indefinitely.

North Carolina, Tennessee, and up the NJ and NY coast have been flooded by Hurricanes Ida or Fred, but that is another story.

There may not be more hurricanes in number than before, but they are producing more rain over larger areas due to warming ocean currents and warmer overall temperatures. And as is often the case, the poorer people seem to suffer the most as they have fewer resources to cope and adjust. This indeed is Climate Injustice affecting our more vulnerable populations.






