

A Message from Your President

As I'm tabulating information from your reports, I'm encountering unsettling issues that our Blue Ridge District is facing in 2022. COVID continues to wreak havoc with our plans. How can we live out our purpose and vision when we can't even meet on a regular basis? Our units are facing shrinking membership numbers and the aging of members. We can't entice younger women to join.

The only help I have to offer is Frances Womack Yelton's example. She attended Gilboa UMC, a small rural church in Rutherfordton County, North Carolina. When I Googled her name, all I found was her obituary. There didn't seem to be anything special except that "she was a loyal member of United Methodist Women" (www.mcmahanfuneralhome.com).

Frances obviously belonged to one of those units whose numbers are shrinking and whose members are getting older. In fact, Frances's unit shrank until she was the only member left! Our president at the time, Joanie Strohm discovered around 2015 that Frances (in her 90's by then) was a one-woman unit. Joanie called Frances who said she intended to keep the Gilboa UMW unit going as long as she was able. She also intended to make a pledge and contribute to the Five Channels of Mission Giving. She was going to do what she could. She didn't quit until she died in 2019 at the age of 95.

UMW faced difficult times in Frances's lifetime, also, times when members felt they surely couldn't or didn't want to continue. They faced polio, not as deadly as COVID but probably just as scary because its target was children. Women became liberated and much more outspoken than Frances's generation. Don't you imagine that many in Frances's age group were unhappy when these "feminist" upstarts infiltrated their ranks and wanted to take over? Her generation faced the turmoil of sexual revolution and the violence of the Civil Rights Movement. I imagine that some of these issues caused people to leave UMW or want to give up.

My point is we're not the first generation of UMW members to face difficulties that seem overwhelming. We must remain passionate, loyal members, as Frances Yelton did, and we must do what we can.

Whatever happens, let's not lose hope, and let's not convince ourselves that we can't do anything because we can't do everything.

Hello to all the women of the Blue Ridge District!

Welcome to 2022 and a new year of working for women, youth and children. The ladies of Blue Ridge District outdid themselves during last year. Our pledge was \$82,100 for the year and the Blue Ridge District's contributions in undesignated giving totaled \$83,073.81. Yes, we not only made our pledge, but we exceeded it by over a thousand dollars. We have kept our pledge at the same level as the last pre-pandemic year. With so many difficulties we have lived with during the past year, it shows how remarkable and determined our ladies are in giving to missions. Congratulations to you all!

There is more good news. The Western North Carolina Conference pledged \$500,000. Our Conference sent in \$504,943 which was \$4,943 over our Conference pledge, meaning our Conference goal was also met and exceeded.

Now we are embarking on a new year. We are in the third year of the Covid pandemic and will continue to have to navigate all that entails with flexibility and a trace of humor. It will continue to require flexibility and possibly learning new skills.

While we strive to live with Covid and remain healthy, many women, children and youth have so much more to worry about, such as having drinkable water, earning an income, caring for children, having health care and much more. We give to Mission to help them. The needs of the children, youth and women cry out to be met. Their needs are a calling we work to meet year after year. Let's get off to a great start for 2022.



Here are some other resources for celebrating that you and your unit might enjoy. Read the books **Where Do We Go from Here**, by Dr. Martin Luther King, (2019); **Hidden Figures**, the true story of the four African-American Women who helped the US launch into space, (2021-22); **Rise! From Caged Bird to Poet of the People**, the story of Maya Angelo, (2021-22); or **Pre-Post Racial American – Spiritual Stories**, (2017).

Some other helpful books on the "Reading List" include **Do All Lives Matter?**, (2019), **So You Want to Talk About Race**, (2018), **Liberating Black Church History** (2017), **Pushout**, (which will be our mission study in March), and many others. Its special offering supports education, training and ministries of deaconesses and home missioners. A special program is included in the 2022 Program Book and a packet of resources was recently mailed to all churches. Schedule your celebration soon!

A Look Back...

A look back 130+ years (1887) reveals many changes from the original "calls to prayer" celebrations of our predecessor home and foreign missionary societies:

Timing: Recommended meeting times have been in December, around Thanksgiving, in the Spring, and now, as "each Unit decides."

The Observance: The original plan celebrated a "Week of Prayer & Self Denial" with daily meetings Monday-Thursday with the all-day "Quiet Day" service on Friday. The themes were meditation, mission education, intercession and sacrificial giving. The "Quiet Day" worship service culminated with an offering (and/or pledge.) Today, program time is half-an-hour at best; "sacrifice" and "self-denial" are not contemporary concepts. Offerings are often budgeted.

Name Change: "A week" (of prayer and self-denial) implies an event with purpose; a "call to prayer" seems a nebulous invitation. The change reflected the reality of changing times. Did the change unwittingly change our perception of the importance of this annual observance?

Offerings: The purpose of the offerings varied among the societies, but was usually for a program/project beyond budget capacity such as a new building. (In 1954 an Asheville building near Berry Temple Church was constructed with a Call to Prayer grant.) Offerings have declined drastically over the decades from just under a million dollars in 1985 (\$996,673) to \$434,844 in 2020.

The Call to Prayer and Self-Denial, after all these years and changes, remains a significant observance of United Methodist Women!
