

WELCOME to 2022! One of the Northern Piedmont District's goals this year is to have quarterly book studies from the United Methodist Women reading list. *She Came to Slay* by Erica Armstrong Dunbar is a story for youth about the life of Harriet Tubman. The author presents a fresh take on Harriet Tubman by blending biography, illustrations, photos and engaging sidebars that illuminate the life of Tubman as never before.

This is a joint book study with the Blue Ridge District on Saturday, February 5, from 10:00-11:30 a.m. via Zoom. NORTHERN PIEDMONT DISTRICT UMW GODWINKS

How does God find you during the Covid-19, Delta, and Omicron virus pandemic? Did you hear God, feel his presence and/or witnessed his intervention in a normal or an unusual circumstance? What happened to make you feel that God is in control and is with you all the time? United Methodist Women testimonies are solicited to help heal and provide HOPE to a world in crisis as well as to leave a legacy of stories for generations to come. This is our opportunity to share how God leads us during times of uncertainty and illness. Share how He strengthens "you and others you know" to overcome adversity. Consider these Godwinks as comparable to the walk through the Red Sea on dry land. As we are encouraged by past pandemic stories, what better gift can we bequeath to believers and non-believers, Our God-wink moments.

DEFINITION: 1) A God-wink is an event or personal experience, often identified as coincidence, so astonishing that it's seen as a sign of divine intervention, especially when perceived as the answer to a prayer; 2) Messages of reassurance and encouragement from God throughout one's life to reassure an individual that s/he is on the right track (Squire D. Rushnell)

To help each unit get started read explanations about *12 Ways to see God Wink at you*: 1)Try a test; 2) Listen to messengers, and be one yourself; 3) Look for the extraordinary in the ordinary; 4) Dig into your memories; 5) Embrace hope; 6) Consider the big picture; 7) Embrace comfort, 8) Confirm that prayer works; 9) See the blessing hidden inside unanswered prayers; 10) Consider the timing; 11) Look for winks in your relationships with family; and12) Take steps toward your dreams (Whitney Hopler). <u>https://www.crosswalk.com/faith/spiritual-life/see-god-wink-at-you-1417375.html</u>. Local Unit Story: Water for Life

At our UMW Christmas gathering, we started a new tradition whereby we each donate money for a **special Mission project.** Last year (2020) we sent bees, chickens and a goat through Heifer International. It felt so good to be going above and beyond, so we decided to do it again.

This Christmas, when all was donated and tallied, we had collected over twice the amount as last year. We excitedly looked over the pamphlets and made suggestions. "How about two flocks of chickens (\$20 each), a hive of bees (\$30) and an alpaca (\$150)?" "How about a water buffalo (\$250)? It says here they can plant four times the crops with a buffalo than by hand." "What about the Hope Basket (\$50)? It includes some rabbits and some chicks!" Oh, we were having a grand time deciding how to use this money.

Then a quiet voice said, "What about water for life?" Water for life.... where is that on our pamphlet? I was stuck on chickens and bees, so where was this?

The quiet voice of our pastor spoke again. "If I make up the difference in cost, can we do Water for Life?"

Then, we all see what she is referring to at the bottom of the page. Water for Life: \$750.00. Wow! Water, something so simple that we all take for granted everyday. Immediately, we all agreed. We would need about another \$150 to do it. So we all started chipping in a little more and a little more, then the pastor added the last \$40. Water for Life! **Our little group of ten ladies sent somebody WATER for LIFE.**

I still get a lump in my throat when I think about how I felt at the moment, and I think of this scripture from Matt 25:35-40 (paraphrased): "I was hungry and you gave me food to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink [...] When you have done it for one of the least of these brothers and sisters, you have done it for me."


