

February 4 is Transit Equity Day – a national day of action that commemorates the birthday of Rosa Parks by declaring that public transit is a civil right. Rosa Parks chose the tactic of refusing to give up her seat on the bus to demand an end to segregation in the Montgomery, Alabama, transit system. Transit Equity Day honors this act of resistance by advocating for the rights of all people to quality public transportation powered by clean or renewable energy. Mt. Tabor United Methodist Church in Winston-Salem is hosting Navigating Jim Crow: Green Book and Oasis Spaces in North Carolina during the month of February. "The Negro Motorist Green Book," published between 1936 and 1966, was both a travel guide and a tool of resistance designed to confront the realities of racial discrimination in the United States and beyond. The book listed over 300 North Carolina businesses—from restaurants and hotels, to tourist homes, nightclubs and beauty salons—in the three decades that it was published. The exhibit will be on display for two additional dates and times: Sunday, February 6 and Sunday, February 20. On both dates the exhibit will be open from 1 pm – 4 pm. 
From Glenda Beauchamp, District Leadership Development Chair

Oftentimes we dread going to yet another meeting. However, when you get there, we find there is something more to learn.




