Tracey Owens, Activities Coordinator at Brooks Howell. served as Mission Speaker at Annual Celebration. She reminded us of our mission legacy by sharing the experiences of some of the dedicated deaconesses and missionaries she has met in her work at Brooks Howell.

<u>Historian</u>

Mary McLeod Bethune Educator, Humanitarian, Churchwoman, Civil Rights Leader. 1875-1955

On July 13, 2022, an 11-foot, 6,129-pound white marble statue of Mary McCleod Bethune was installed in Sanctuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol Building, presented by the State of Florida to honor her lifelong work. In 1904, with only \$1.50 and five students, she opened the Daytona Literary and Industrial School for Negro Girls, now United Methodist Bethune-Cookman University, offering 45 degrees to 2600 students.

In 1935 she founded the National Council of Negro Women and served as its president until her death. During her lifetime she was an Advisor to four U.S. presidents. From 1940-1944 she was an Advisor to the Women's Division of Christian Service (predecessor of United Methodist Women). Working with its Committee on Minority Groups and International Cooperation, they planned for and implemented inter-racial cooperation among Black and White members of the Woman's Societies and Wesleyan Services Guilds.

On July 10, 1974, over 20,000 persons witnessed the dedication ceremonies and unveiling of the Mary McLeod Memorial in Jefferson Park, Washington, DC, a 17' bronze statue of Bethune with two children. It was the first monument to a Black person or woman on public land in the nation's Capitol.

For over a decade the National Council of Negro Women with dozens of business, civic, professional and religious groups contributed to the effort. One was the Women's Division. According to the Congressional Record, July 19, 1971, it was the assurance of \$100,000 from the Division that secured the last congressional vote to extend the deadline for the completion of the Memorial.

Mrs. C. Clifford Cummings, national president of United Methodist Women, was one of 40 invited guests seated on the platform during the unveiling Ceremonies. United Methodist Women formed the first Honor Guard of the 24-hour Vigil of the Monument. The Division had 15 official delegates, and hundreds of other United Methodists attended,

Mary McLeod Bethune was born in Mayesville, SC, the 15th child of freed slaves. United Methodist Women in that area continue to celebrate her legacy.

Social Action

The Power of One

This article's title may bring to mind the 1989 novel by Australian author Bryce Courtenay, set in South Africa during the 1930s and 1940s. It tells the story of a young English boy who takes up boxing and develops a passion for changing the world.

But since then the phrase has become an important principle for individuals to find and use their own personal power--the power to believe in yourself, the power to **be** good and to **do** good, and the strength and courage to never, never, never NEVER give up.

The word "power" occurs 263 times in the Bible. It comes from the Greek word dunamis, which can be translated "mighty works," "powerful works," and even "miracles." These powerful accomplishments, typically beyond normal human capability, refer both to things that Jesus did, (Mark 5:30; Acts 10:38), as well as works performed by Him *through others*, such as one of the apostles (Acts 6:8; 19:11; II Corinthians 12:12).

Throughout all of history, we know that countless movements of change have been inspired by the actions of *one* person. Martin Luther King, Jr., Rosa Parks, Susan B. Anthony, and Malala Yousafzai are just a few names that come to mind. I know you can think of a lot more.

But in the past several years our culture has seen upheaval and great changes the likes of which none of us have ever witnessed before or even imagined. The pandemic caused isolation, loneliness, and insecurity. Health care, the economy, violent crime, gender and racial inequality– the list keeps getting longer – are among many concerns that keep a lot of us awake at night.

A wide range of recent social and political issues have made us hesitant to speak out or demand action for fear of being labeled as bigoted, biased, racist, hateful, too conservative, too liberal, anti-'this', pro-'that', and so on and so on. Church attendance has dropped dramatically, and with it has come further feelings of anxiety and insignificance.

As United Women in Faith our advocacy is weakened when our fear of being labeled holds us back. For over 150 years our organization has been a tremendously *power*ful movement that understands the real work of advocating for justice: through gender and racial equality, supporting oppressed and dispossessed communities, lessening the disproportionate impact of change on the marginalized and the poor. It's where **racial justice** meets the **climate change** movement meets **economic inequality** meets **maternal & child health** meets **mass incarceration** meets any other **social justice ideal**.

Queen Elizabeth II said: "We sometimes think the world's problems are so big, that we can do little to help. But the cumulative impact of thousands of small acts of goodness can be bigger than we imagine."

You *can* make a difference, and so can I. We can make one choice that may change someone's life forever. Each of us holds the Power of One, and together, with God as our refuge and strength, we can change the world.

Mission Today 2022 – Reduced criteria due to COVID-19 United Women in Faith, Western North Carolina Conference

MAKE A DIFFERENCE! Become a Mission Today Unit!

NEW IN 2020 and continuing in 2022:

Mission Today Gold – Complete 10 criteria: 6 with asterisks (*) and 4 other.** Mission Today Silver - Complete 8 criteria: 4 with asterisks (*) and 4 other.** Mission Today Bronze - Complete 6 criteria: 4 with asterisks (*) and 2 other.** **Note: "Other" may also include items with asterisks (*).

CRITERIA:

*1. The Unit will make a Pledge to Mission.

*2. The unit will use the Prayer Calendar at each general meeting or circle meeting of the unit to pray for persons in mission and our mission work with women, children and youth. A new Prayer Calendar is printed annually and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center. Prayer Calendar entries are posted on our UMW website and FaceBook page.

*3. The unit will use at least two programs from the Program Book during the year. A new Program Book is printed every year and may be ordered from the Mission Resource Center.

*4. The unit or circle will conduct or participate in at least one mission study each year. Contact your district or conference Mission Coordinator for Education & Interpretation to learn what the studies are for each year. (If members of your unit attend all 4 sessions of the virtual conference Mission u or your District Mission Study and your unit takes an action growing out of the study, Gift to Mission, ministry related to the study, etc., your unit will meet this criteria.)

*5. The unit will have at least two members subscribing to **response** (1 member subscribing with units less than 15 members; Local unit subscription may count as one.) Order information is printed at bottom of page 2. \$24.00 for a one-year print subscription (includes digital subscription); \$20 for a one-year digital only subscription.

- *6. The unit will implement the Charter for Racial Justice in at least two ways during the year. Possibilities
 - are: a. Have members read and discuss books and articles about other races and cultures;

b. Sponsor or attend an interethnic event between two or more units;

c. Intentionally recruit women of other ethnic groups to be members and officers of the unit; d. Use the Resources for Racial Justice Available on our conference website on the "Downloads Available" page under "Mission Resources."

e. Write to elected representatives to support legislation affecting issues such as immigration, affirmative action, low-income programs, civil rights, etc.

If you are a "Justice Today" unit, you have met this criteria. See "Downloads Available" on conference website.

*7. The unit will have a program and/or complete an action addressing one of the Issue Priorities for 2021-2024. These are 1. Climate Justice; and 2. Criminalization of Communities of Color and Mass Incarceration. You may find information at <u>www.unitedmethodistwomen.org/focus-issues.</u>

*8. The unit will add at least two new members (one member for units with less than 15 members) to its roll. *9. The unit will have one program from the <u>Social Principles of the United Methodist Church 2017-</u> <u>2020</u>. Available at <u>www.Cokesbury.com</u> for \$2.59 plus tax and shipping. A newer version is not yet available.

*10. The unit will contribute to all Five Channels of Mission Giving.

*11. The UMW Purpose will be recited at each general and/or circle meeting, including virtual

meetings.

*12. The unit will contribute \$186.90 or more to the Legacy Fund in 2021.

13. At least one member of the unit will attend Mission u and report back to the unit on classes and events they experienced. Virtual participation gualifies as attending.

14. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend the district or conference annual meeting and report back to the unit about the event and what they experienced. Virtual participation qualifies.

15. The unit will have at least one person joining the United Methodist Women's Action Network to receive and respond to legislative information at least three (3) times a year. report.

16. Members will correspond with five persons listed in the Prayer Calendar at least once a year.

17. The unit will co-sponsor, with the local church, a Children's Sabbath. (This is a worship service highlighting the needs of children.) The United Methodist Women National Office and the Council of Bishops support this effort. Children's Sabbath materials are on our national website: <u>www.unitedmethodistwomen.org</u>.Type "Children's Sabbath" in the search box.

18. Each unit or circle meeting will include a "**response** Moment" where an item from **response** magazine will be lifted up as a way to tell the mission story.

19. The unit will sponsor one teen member (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman member (ages 18 to 39) to at least one conference event during the year.

20. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will attend a district Prayer Breakfast, district Day Apart, conference Spiritual Growth Retreat, or any other special district or conference event other than Ubuntu Day. Virtual participation in any of these events qualify as attending.

21. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will participate in an Ubuntu Day Event. Units may develop their own UBUNTU event in their communities.

22. At least two members (one member for units with less than 15 members) will complete Plan 1 of the Reading Program and give a report to the unit on one of the books read. Type "Reading Program" in search box on website.

23. The unit will invite a district or conference officer, other than a member of the unit, to one of the unit meetings during the year and/or for their United Methodist Women's Sunday. May be Virtual This Qualifies as a Local Unit Visit (LUV).

24. The unit will add one new teen (ages 12 to 17) and/or one young woman (ages 18 to 39) circle during the year, or one new teen member (ages 12 to 17) or one new young woman member (ages 18 to 39) during the year.

25. 100% of the unit's active members will make a gift of at least \$18.69 to the Legacy Fund

26. The 2021 Conference Financial Goal is: Each unit will make at least one Gift to Mission, of at least \$5.00, using cards they have, in honor of one person in Mission listed in either the **Prayer Calendar** or **response** magazine article. The unit will help accomplish the goal by sending at least one Gift to Mission in 2021 as stated above.

27. Each unit will be responsible for supporting at least one local mission project and participate in one Conference Hands-on Mission Project during the year. The local project should be listed on your Mission Today report.

UMCOR Menstrual Hygiene Kit ("Period Pack") Materials

- One one-gallon size re-sealable bag
- Two 2 oz. bottle hand sanitizer
- Three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags
- One travel pack of wet ones
- 10 Tampons (5 regular and 5 super absorbency)
 - Unscented
- 10 Sanitary Napkins
 - Unscented
 - Long super ultra-thin
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger)
 - No Ivory or Jergen's soap
 - Do not remove from packaging
- One pack of flushable wipes (42 count)
 - Unscented
- One travel sink-size laundry detergent (.25-.45 oz.)

Assembly Directions:

- Start with a one-gallon resealable bag.
- Place one pack of the flushable wipes and wet wipes in the bag.
- Place four-bathroom trash bags and the 10 sanitary napkins in the bag.
- Then, add the smaller items in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.

Important Notes:

- All items must be new.
- Do not wash any of the items as they will no longer be considered new.
- Do not include any personal notes, money or additional materials in the kits.
- Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols.

UMCOR Hygiene Kit

- One hand towel (15 x 25 17 x 27 inches-No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels)
- One washcloth
- One comb (Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth, no pocket combs or picks, rattail and combs without handles are acceptable but must have at least 6 inches of teeth
- One toenail or fingernail clipper (No emery boards or metal nail files)
- Bath-size soap (3 oz. bar or larger-No lvory or Jergen's soap; do not remove from packaging)
- One adult toothbrush (Do not remove from packaging. Personal advertising not acceptable.)
- 10 adhesive bandages (³/₄ by 3 inches-Common household bandages acceptable)

All items must be placed in one-gallon size re-sealable bag.
