

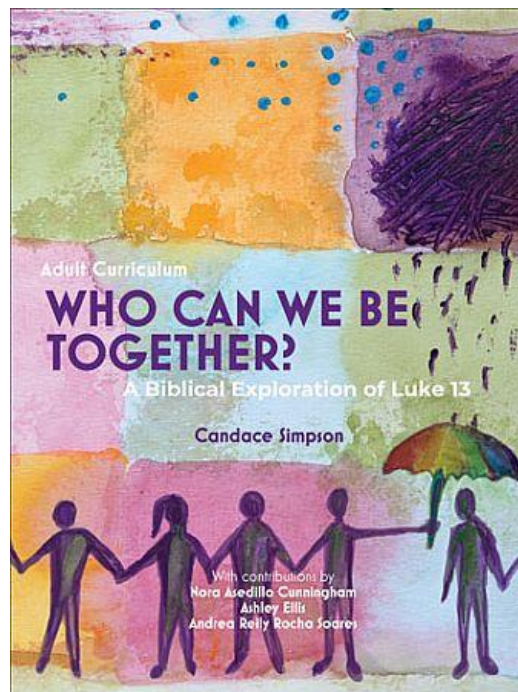

A Message from Your President

New beginnings always excite me. Knowing where I've been helps me know where I want to go. Using that concept, I want to share information gleaned from your End of Year Reports that informs and challenges us.

In 2022, we lost units and members to disaffiliations and church closures, but we're entering 2023 with 43 units and nearly a thousand members.

The reports show that many units added new members. Central UWF, our largest unit with 108 members, added a new circle with 16 members! They are newly retired women eager to become more involved in their churches and communities.

We are a district of small units. Twenty-three of our forty-three units have fifteen or fewer members, while eleven of those have ten or fewer. Our smallest unit has four members, but a member of one of those units told me how important the connection to UWF is to them.

The reports show how involved we are in local, national, and international ministries. Locally, our units support similar ministries: women's shelters, backpack programs, school supplies, Christmas gifts for children, food pantries, work with the homeless and the elderly, and B.E.A.R. closets, among others.

Some units are also involved in unique ministries at home and further afield. Skyland is sending layette kits to Alaska while St. Paul's collects cloth bags for fishermen in Willow, AK. Oak Grove church/UWF goes annually to West Virginia with supplies for a coal mining community. Groce partners with a UWF unit in Kentucky to help victims from last summer's devastating, killing storms. Spruce Pine's UWF/church is using the church fellowship hall for homeless people in Mitchell County. Through Ministry of Hope, Black Mountain participates in the Read-Me-A-Story Program. Their unit donates books to women in a nearby correctional facility. The women read/record the books and then send both the tape and the book to their biological or adopted child.

Internationally, units supported war-torn Ukraine, Agape in Armenia, scholarships for girls in Kenya, and Liberia with help to buy a van.

I began by saying your EOY data offers challenges. One challenge is the gap between the amount we give locally and the amount we pledge. We ***must*** support our local communities. However, we must not forget that we are a global organization. The national and international mission institutions we celebrate in the Prayer Guide, *response*, podcasts, etc., cannot exist without the pledge, the lifeblood of UWF. I close by recommending that as local units we compare the amount of our pledge with our total giving. If, as I expect, our pledge is quite a bit less than our total giving, let's consider how we can better balance the two. Let's live into our heritage of generous giving via the pledge!

Just a reminder that all unit treasurers need to send in their names and contact information along with the unit president's name and contact information to me as soon as possible. The unit's pledge amount for 2023 should also be sent in.

Blue Ridge District is a special district. Our women work hard, believe in our mission and purpose. Let's look at what we are planning to do this coming year and see if there are opportunities to work together to meet our unit pledges. We only missed by 4% . If we can do as well in 2023, maybe a new twist to a fundraiser or a few more pennies each week to our World Thank offering jar or a new opportunity for others to join us in giving can put us over the top. Membership Nurture & Outreach

Greetings! I appreciate this opportunity to serve on the district executive team. I recently retired from the McDowell County School system and am ready for some new challenges!

Speaking of challenges, one that we all face is recruitment. We all love this organization, but how do we let others know what they are missing out on by not being a part of it? Everyone is so busy—why should they commit to one more thing?

Since I am a newbie to this role, I went directly to the Western NC Conference UWF website to see what kind of ideas they offer. Here are some membership tips from Molly Welch, the conference Mission Coordinator for Membership Nurture & Outreach, along with my added comments:

- You do **not** have to be a United Methodist to be a member of United Women in Faith. I do like how our new name reflects this.
- It can take at least **five invitations** for someone to accept when you invite them to see what we are about. Wow! So don't give up after asking someone one or two times.
- **Nurture** your current membership while inviting others to join you on our journey. We don't want to take our current members for granted. Are we meeting their needs?
- What do you **love** about United Women in Faith? **TELL SOMEONE!** If your church uses social media, you can include photos showing that fun Christmas party, putting together kits for UMCOR, or the rummage sale for missions. Think about showing relationships and fellowship!
- **Participate in District and Conference events** . . . you will learn, grow spiritually, and be a part of a creative, supportive fellowship of women whose focus is mission with women, children and youth. At first, I found it hard to make this jump, but it was worth it!
- **Invite all women** of your church to join you! Depending on the size of your church, send an invitation to every woman not currently involved. Or hold a casual information session after church one Sunday so women can drop in and get more information.
- **Do not assume** everyone understands what we mean when we say things like: Call to Prayer and Self-Denial, Unit Meeting, Circle/Group Meeting, Gift to Mission, Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, etc. It is easy to use the language we are used to, completely forgetting that others may have no idea what we are talking about! Don't forget to explain as much as possible in your communications to the congregation.
- If you go to wncumw.org/membership-nurture-outreach/, you will not only find these tips, but you will find "125 Membership Ideas" in a blue box when you scroll down. Hopefully, some of these ideas will help you keep your unit growing and vibrant as we continue to meet our purpose.

A Shout Out for Secretaries!

After attending her first staff meeting, a newly elected executive asked, “Does every meeting begin with prayer and securing a “volunteer” secretary? “Yes!” “Then I’ll be 15 minutes late for every meeting!”

Who has not sat through the “deafening silence” after a presiding officer asks for a volunteer secretary? Papers are shuffled, eye contact avoided, and the agenda studiously reviewed! Why? Why is the task of secretary so dreaded and avoided?

Secretarial skills are acquired, not inherited. “Good” minute-taking comes with attentive listening, recording votes and *actions*, and practice. “Practice makes perfect,” they say! Don’t worry, imperfections will be cited immediately (by those non-volunteers.) Minutes are not flowery or exciting, but they are the official (and probably the only) record of the organization’s life and work. Minutes become:

- Immediate accounting of “what happened.”
- Guidance for changing leadership.
- Information for absentees
- Source of legal verifications (changing bank account details)
- Informal history
- “Gold mine” for future research

In 1869, at the official organizing meeting of the Woman’s Foreign Missionary Society, they elected a Recording Secretary, an assistant Recording Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary. Through the following decades these women and their successors (volunteer and/or paid) have provided an unbroken account of women’s mission activity, finances, policies, projects; and maintained annual appointment records of hundreds of missionaries and deaconesses. After 153+ years, this remarkable accounting tells us who we are today and how we got this way!

So, here’s a salute to all secretaries!
