While challenging, it has also reminded me of what I love about United Women in Faith. Can you believe the year is half over? And our United Women in Faith's year is a little more than half over. Unit Treasurers have sent their 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter reports and checks to me. Thank you to each Treasurer for your dedication to United Women in Faith.

Blue Ridge District United Women in Faith thank you for your mission giving in 2023. The contribution of each unit is extremely important in supporting UWF efforts around the world.

Our total amount sent to the Conference Treasurer for half of this year is \$33,236.88. Our undesignated giving totaled \$28,671.82, which is applied to our yearly pledge to mission of \$82,100. As you can see, we are not half way to our pledge goal with half the year behind us. I am sure all units are working to help us reach all our goals for UWF mission giving. I can capture the credit for each unit for funds donated that are sent to me with a remittance. Funds that are sent in directly to other offices are not tracked through my records, I do not have the ability to track as I do not usually receive any information from the other offices concerning the donations. If you do not see a donation credited through the district records and you think it should have been, please ask your local treasurer about it.

During the first half of this year, Blue Ridge United Women in Faith contributed **\$1,527.84** to the Legacy Fund. Western North Carolina Conference United Women in Faith has been working hard to ensure our traditions and mission work continue into the future. A large part of being able to contribute to our future is due to the prayers and thoughtful contributions of Blue Ridge District United Women in Faith.

Many of our units are small in the number of members, but we are all big in heart and in working for United Women in Faith. I am very proud to be serving you as District Treasurer. I encourage you to contact your Nurturing Partner for a visit to your unit meeting or to discuss any issues you may have.

However you spend your time this summer, I pray that your spiritual life will grow as the flowers of the field.



What happens when a White woman, Phoebe, contacts a Black woman, Betty, saying she suspects they are connected through slavery?

Open to exploring difficult truths and sharing an admiration for Dr. Martin Luther King, they embark on a path toward reconciliation.

Each tells her dramatic story – from Betty's experience desegregating her county's only high school, to Phoebe's eventual question to Betty: "How do I begin to repair the harms?"

Remember that eligible books this year range from the 2018-2023 Reading Program lists. Also, remember to watch "Faith Matters" and other videos/podcasts on the national UWF website. Watching three counts for reading two program reading books. Also, watching the movies *Hidden Figures*, *Push-Out*, or *The Hate U Give* count as reading books.

We will continue our donations of used reading books to sell for Missions at live events in 2023, so save your books from 2018-2022 and bring them to the Annual Meeting at East Marion UMC on August 19. HAPPY READING!

#### **Membership Nurture and Outreach**

The passing of Sharon Smith was a huge loss to our unit, district, and conference. Her niece has been wonderful about bringing all the United Women in Faith materials found at Sharon's house to First United Methodist Church of Marion where we continue to go through all the resources Sharon collected over the years.

One booklet I came across in Sharon's collection is titled "United Methodist Women Guidelines for Attracting Newly-Retired Women Membership Campaign." This piqued my interest, especially because some of the WNCC conference materials I recently reviewed suggest that women 35 and over, including recent empty nesters and retirees, are likely to be the folks most interested in joining us. As you look around your church and community for potential new members, keep these ideas from Sharon's booklet in mind:

Start a discussion on membership by asking the members of your unit to divide into groups of two or three and share the answers to these questions:

- How did I first get involved in UWF?
- What excites me most about UWF?
- What does UWF have to offer other women?
- Why am I still a member?

Answers to these questions can provide insights into recruiting new members, but also into nurturing your current membership. If your unit is serious about attracting new members, the booklet suggests having your members also answer these questions:

- Are you willing to open your unit to new members?
- Are you willing to change meeting times?
- Are you willing to make your unit programs challenging, creative, and exciting?
- Are you willing to let go of some of your power and control?

The booklet goes on to emphasize that good programs are a key to not only attracting new members but also in maintaining the interest and support of current members. Other suggestions for expanding your membership include the following:

- Promote a "Woman of the Month" at your church that may or may not be a member of UWF.
- Give a subscription to response magazine as a gift.
- Promote the Reading Program and Book Club.
- Share leadership.
- Provide a new member with a "friendship partner" for a year.
- Schedule fun things to do as part of the unit meeting.

When starting a membership drive, start small—you do not have to try everything at once! Probably the best way to promote UWF is to tell others by words and actions how UWF has enriched your life by strengthening your relationship to God, creating bonds with other women in your church and community, and helping others through local, national, and global missions.

#### Historian

#### Mission Knowledge = Informed Prayerful Giving

The women of the newly formed Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (1869) voted to send two women missionaries to India even though the organization had neither a membership base nor a financial plan. They saw a great need and had faith it could be met. Their solution! Tell the story and seek interested women to join them with "two cents a week and a prayer."

Decades later (1900's) the women of the Methodist Episcopal South had also sent women missionaries and established schools, hospitals and community centers. The expense of new buildings was beyond the annual national budget. Their solution! An annual observance combining mission information, meditations, prayer and intercessions and sacrificial giving: "The Week of Prayer and Self-Denial." It was an indepth program:

- a) Women gathered daily, Monday-Thursday, for prayer, meditations and information about the offering objectives.
- They gathered for an all-day "Quiet Day" service on Friday culminating in a sacrificial offering which was a designated offering – half for the US and half for world missions.

In more recent times (1950's), women of the Evangelical United Brethren Women's Society of World Service developed a "Plan of Work" with this reminder:

When we depend on money, we get what money can do
When we depend on organization, we get what organizations can do.
When we depend on programs and education, we get what programs and
education can do.

But when we depend on prayer, we get what God can do.

Today online giving, donation buttons, and QR codes are becoming standard even in churches. It is giving devoid of prayer. It can be UN-informed giving!

United Women in Faith must use our resources (<u>response</u> magazine & <u>Prayer</u> Guide) and maintain our tradition of informed giving.

#### **Communications**

The Canton Paper Mill closed its doors on May 24th and the final whistle blew on June 8<sup>th</sup>. This whistle echoed through the whole community as a wave of sadness filled the air.

The Paper Mill has been in operation since 1908. In the mill's 115 years of operation, the population of this small town has increased threefold. There have been generations of families that have worked at the paper mill and according to an employee, "It's like losing a family member." The Canton Area Historical Museum said, "This is part of this community's roots and it's part of their culture and it's part of who these people are."

The community is at a loss. As neighbors, we need to stay in constant prayer for these people and ask that if there is anything that we as a community of United Women in Faith can do to assist our neighbors, we would like to help.

#### **Community Outreach Unit Projects**

In our area, we are well aware of the disastrous effects of flooding and hurricane damage that we ourselves have experienced recently just west of Asheville in Haywood County and have sent help thru UCMCOR. When the members of the Miriam Circle at Groce UMC in Asheville learned of the devastating flooding in Knott County, Kentucky, in September 2022, we wanted to reach out to another UWF group in that area to offer our help and our support. We wanted to help in a special way, one women's group to another. Knott County is believed to have lost more people to the flooding than any county in the state.

After contacting our conference office for guidance, we were connected to Hindman UMC and Linda Gayheart. Hindman is a small church and the only United Methodist Church in Knott County. The church had sustained some flooding but were preparing their church to be used as a relief center. Our Circle was able to send a love offering of \$500.00 to be used in any way needed. We weren't able to be with them physically but the members of Hindman UMC felt God's love and our concern through this offering.

#### Western NorthCarolina Conference UWF Mission Institutions

WNCC is home to five of the eighty-eight UWF mission institutions located in the United States. We're going to feature them in the next several issues of the newsletter. The first is Brooks Howell Home, the only one located in the Blue Ridge District.

#### **Brooks Howell Home**

As the district ME&I Coordinator, I am responsible for providing information about the mission institutions sponsored by the UWF. I'm going to highlight a different institution in each newsletter. This time I will write about a place that is very near and dear to me, as well as many of you – Brooks-Howell Home (BHH). I have worked at BHH for almost 14 years and am currently the Director of Activities.

Brooks-Howell Home is a non-profit, charitable continuing care retirement community owned and supported by the UWF. It is located on 10 acres on Merrimon Avenue in Asheville and was originally established as a retirement facility for deaconesses and missionaries. At the 1954 Fourth Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, an offering was taken to be used "in some way for retired deaconesses and missionaries." In April 1955, the Committee for a New Home for Retired Workers was named to study the location for a new retirement home. Questionnaires sent to active and retired deaconesses and missionaries indicated a preference for the Southeastern Jurisdiction and ultimately Asheville was chosen. The property was purchased in 1956 and the first residents arrived in 1957. The name Brooks-Howell honors Mrs. Frank G. Brooks, then president of the Woman's Division of Christian Service, and Miss Mabel K. Howell, former professor of missions at Scarritt College. It is said that Miss Howell taught more missionaries and deaconesses than any other person.


Over the years, buildings have been constructed to provide more residential opportunities and to enrich the lives of those who live there. Independent living in apartments and suites as well as a skilled health care unit meet the desires and concerns of the residents and their families.

The criteria for residency has changed and currently anyone over the age of 62 is eligible to apply to live at BHH. 


### The Legacy Endowment Fund
