Have you ever read the Book of Acts? While many of us are at least familiar with the story behind Pentecost - when the Holy Spirit descended upon the early followers of Jesus and tongues of fire enabled them to speak different languages - I don't hear many sermons preached on Acts.

Most New Testament studies/messages focus on the Gospels OR Paul's letters. Why is Acts often overlooked? Maybe it's because the Gospels are rich with stories, Paul's letters are rich with theology, and Acts is rich with...well, Acts is a mixed bag. It might be loosely described as a travel log, though the book summarizes many years into less than 30 chapters. Theology comes up in the many sermons preached by Peter and Paul, which vary depending on their audience. And there are several encounters and miraculous healings that are reminiscent of the Gospels.

The book *Phoebe* by Paula Gooder is a historical fiction novel that tells the backstory of Phoebe delivering Paul's letter to the Romans and the aftermath. In this study, we will look at the Book of Acts along with the Book of Romans, exploring how these Biblical texts overlap with *Phoebe*'s narrative. We'll also learn historical facts and discuss spiritual questions. AND - IT'S A PAJAMA PARTY! Come wearing your cutest, comfiest PJ's with coffee, tea, hot chocolate or your drink of choice.

Overcoming Through Faith

It seems almost impossible that the fourth quarter of our 2023 United Women in Faith year has already begun. Although our third quarter was not at all as we hoped, *giving has not stopped* and we can celebrate the fact that we are still giving our Mission money to support women, children and youth around the world.

Our total amount sent to the Conference Treasurer through the third quarter was \$34,018. Undesignated Giving totaled \$28,580, which is applied to our 2023 Pledge to Mission of \$70,000. Remember that the United Women in Faith fiscal year ends November 30th. Your Unit Treasurer will be sending all reports and monies to me by that date.

Fourth quarter is historically our largest quarter in Undesignated Giving. As all units seek to complete the five channels of Undesignated Giving, be in prayer that the Northern Piedmont District can meet our annual Pledge to Mission. Given the tremendous hurdle we have to climb in order to meet our pledge, please encourage your unit to, with God's grace and mercy, meet and/or exceed their pledge this year. God gives us difficulties to bring out the best in us!

Our District has contributed \$1,216 to the **Legacy Fund** through the third quarter. Of course, this amount does not include contributions made online directly to National Office. Let's continue to strive and ensure United Women in Faith Missions will survive to serve future generations.

We had a wonderful attendance at our **District Annual Meeting/Celebration**. The program was beautiful! We had a magnificent guest speaker, inspiring praise dancing, a detailed, informative District Treasury report, important updates from various committees, and installation of new District Officers. Many of our units may be small in the number of members, but we are all big in heart and in working for United Women in Faith. **Our undesignated love offering was \$817.02.** Thank you for your generosity! Let us remember the pennies those eight women in Boston saved to send the first two Women's Foreign Missionary Society ladies to India. If they took such action in 1869, just think what we can do in 2023! Please continue the hard work they so diligently started!

Many local units are feeling discouraged, saying member numbers are down, members are getting older, and giving has decreased. Jesus said: "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am among them." We must think about all the lives we have touched through our many Mission gifts over the years, no matter how small.





The United Women in Faith Reading Program is a cherished tradition for our organization. It brings members together to explore, discuss and share books. The books from the UWF Reading Program Catalog are selected to expand our knowledge and grow our appreciation and understanding of God and our world!

The Reading Program features books, movies and podcasts. Click here to see the 2024 Reading Program Catalog or visit www.uwfaith.org and search "reading program." For 2024, books from 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023 and 2024 Reading Program lists are all eligible for Reading Program reporting credit - visit https://bit.ly/RPBookList to download a spreadsheet of all eligible books. Listening to 2+ Faith Talks podcast episodes gives one credit in the Spiritual Growth category. Listening to 2+ Voices from the Field podcast episodes gives one credit in the Education for Mission category. Reading response magazine for one year (six issues) gives one credit in the Nurturing for Community category. Several movies and bonus books are also eligible for credit. Remember to submit your reports to the District to be recognized for completing one of the reading plans.

New in 2024: intergenerational book pairings to encourage an adult and a youth to read about the same subject. Also, visit www.bookshop.org/shop/uwfaith to buy almost any RP book while donating 10% of your purchase to our organization!!

"A Play on Birds" - Creation Care Moment in Mission

Hurricane Idalia "blew in" on August 30, 2023, and "blew out" more than one dozen pink flamingos! The storm drove the birds as much as 1000 miles off course, landing at the Outer Banks of North Carolina. This was reportedly the first confirmed sighting of the tropical species in the wild in our state - a feathery milestone. The birds made their "hide out" at Pea Island Wildlife Refuge on Hatteras Island, NC (News & Record, Tickled Pink, 9/13/23).

American Flamingos breed in the Caribbean and Mexico though were once indigenous to Florida. At the turn of the 20th century, the species became virtually extinct due to hunting and habitat destruction. According to the North Carolina Audubon Society, more recently flamingos have shown up in places like Texas and Florida following storms. Idalia also sent flamingos as far north as Ohio. Researchers tracked the origin of the wind-driven flock to Cuba and the northern coast of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula where the hurricane lingered for days before moving toward Florida.

The future of the flamingo is uncertain given the era of global warming, climate change, and habitat destruction. An increase in global temperature, albeit a small amount, has made a big

difference. By now some flamingos have likely headed back down south, but others may have opted to stay since food sources and habitat are available here.

Reflections on Mission u

United Women in Faith members prepare for faithful living and action by engaging in transformative educational experiences annually at Mission u events. These are centered around a curriculum that is designed to motivate, inform and enrich our commitment to global ministry. If you have never attended, please make plans to join us at Mission u 2024 as we explore the good news of Jesus Christ and what it means for our lives.

The 2023 Mission and Retreat Study Leaders: Deaconess Renee Hayes, a previous Mission u Youth Camp Leader, also works with Gifts of Grace Ministries in Mission to Lithuania; Sherry Sink, program Advisory Group member, has led mission studies for both youth and adults and has served in various UMW/UWF Conference and District offices; Worship Leader Laurin Allred, leads youth and young adult ministries at Guilford College UMC, Greensboro - She is a band member (Champagne and Kevlar) and proud mother of two boys.

Over the course of two days participants were invited to quiet time in the Chapel, Saturday morning devotion, to donate UMCOR kits, and travel the stations of the cross! The mission study was combined with arts & crafts activities, dramatic performance/skits and other visuals. My favorite part was the discussion of various versions of the Lord's Prayer, Matthew 6:9-13, including a King James, New International (personal choice) and Aramaic/English translation. We learned that the Aramaic translation is most likely what Jesus taught during his Sermon on the Mount -

Abwoon d'bwashmaya (O Birther Father-Mother of the Cosmos.)

Nethqadash shmakh (Focus your light within us-make it useful.)

Teytey malkuthakh (Create your reign of unity now-)

Newey tzevyananch aykanna d'bwahmaya aph b'arha (Your one desire then acts with ours, as in all light, so in all forms.)

Hawvlan lachma d'sunqanan yaomana (Grant what we need each day in bread and insight.)

Wahboqlan khaubayn (wakhtahayn) aykanna daph khnan shbwoqan I'khayyabayn

(Loose the cords of mistakes binding us, as we release the strands we hold of others' of guilt.)

Wela tahlan l'nesyuna Ela patzan min bisha

(Don't let surface things delude us, but free us from what holds us back.)

Metol dilakhie malkutha wahayla wateshbukhta l'ahlam almin. Ameyn.

(From you is born all ruling will, the power and the life to do, the song that beautifies all, from age to age, it renews. Truly-power to these statements - may they be the ground from which all my actions grow: Amen.)
