

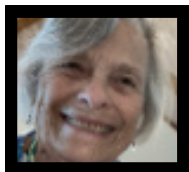

I was browsing through the UWFaith.org website and came across a recap of the spring meeting of the UWFaith Program Advisory Group (PAG); the meeting focused on achieving UWFaith's vision and strategic goals by influencing through storytelling, emphasizing how one voice can have a ripple effect that makes a big difference. The meeting started with a worship message about being salt and light, or in the words of Deaconess Caitlyn Hansen, "bringing out the God-flavors." Giving is Always Good! Always!

Appalachian District Sisters,
Mission: It ALL matters

We are now in that time of the year when, weather-wise, we just have to take it as it comes. Here in Boone, we know we can expect it to be mild and moderate one day and the next we find ourselves pulling out the winter coat. “Layer weather” is what some call it. I find that it is that final layer that makes the difference. It takes them all. “Many-layers weather.”

When I consider UWFaith, it is the same thing; each one matters well beyond the direct recipient, because each helps build and strengthen the communities they impact.

UWFaith Mission Giving is especially powerful because in many cases it supports missions that otherwise would have been overlooked. Missions that are unspectacular but which really undergird a system of missions that, in concert, deliver mighty results, create hope and build community.

For instance, UWFaith funds help support the Deaconess and Home Missioner (DHM) ministry program. An example is Home Missioner Helen Ryde (Sept. 11, 1965-Sept. 2, 2025,) who was consecrated as a home missioner at General Conference in 2016. At that time, her ministry was serving as a regional organizer for the Southeast Jurisdiction of the Reconciling Ministries Network, whose work eventually led to the removal of harmful anti-LGBTQ+ language from our Book of Discipline. Ryde also believed that we cannot move forward as an inclusive denomination without committing ourselves to antiracism and anticolonialism. A visionary, Ryde thought beyond the education of DHMs and invited us to consider our role in shaping the education and formation of all laity across the denomination. For those who knew her, you probably also knew that Ryde was drawn to the margins. Ryde believed deeply in the power of transformation—that everyone is capable of growth and renewal. This conviction led Ryde into spaces that many of us might avoid, building genuine relationships and community, recognizing that what often presents as hate, rejection, or condemnation is often rooted in fear. By being willing to listen, engage, and stay present, Ryde literally changed hearts and minds. Ryde’s legacy reminds us that relationships, trust, dialogue, and steadfast commitment to those whom society, and even the church, have left behind, are at the heart of transformation. Through example, Ryde’s light rose brilliantly in the darkness. It will continue to shine for generations to come.* It is these kinds of un-heralded but powerful missions that our Mission Giving fosters and allows to flourish.

Supporting Bees in North Carolina: What You Can Do

Eco Justice can be realized and actioned against in many ways. One simple way to help is to help make sure that the environment is taken care of. It is especially important to do this in areas where they may not have the funding to take these actions.

Why Bees Matter in NC

Bees play a critical role in pollinating roughly 80% of flowering plants, including many fruits and vegetables essential to North Carolina's agriculture and ecosystem health.

Ways You Can Help

- **Plant Native, Pollinator-Friendly Landscapes:** Use native wildflowers, shrubs, and trees adapted to NC's regions. Include blooms for spring, summer, and fall.
- **Create Safe Nesting Spots:** Add bee condos or nesting blocks for cavity-nesting species and maintain bare-soil patches for ground-nesting bees.
- **Minimize Chemical Use:** Avoid synthetic pesticides and herbicides. If necessary, apply in early evening and notify local beekeepers.
- **Support Local Beekeepers:** Buy local honey and hive products. Volunteer with pollinator conservation groups.
- **Learn, Share & Connect:** Explore NC State's Beekeeper Education programs and join initiatives like the Butterfly Highway.

Take Action Today

By planting native species, creating safe nesting environments, reducing pesticide use, and engaging with your community, you can make a meaningful difference for bees in North Carolina.

Secretary of Program Resources

In the last newsletter, I shared news about the reading program in our local unit. By sharing a children's book from each of the five categories during our regular meetings, we were able to increase the number of participants in the reading program drastically and increase the number of books read for some already in the program. This year I told the group that last year we bottle-fed them, so this year we are going to wean them a little bit. We started the reading program for the year by reading a children's book to get everyone started. This year I am encouraging members to move up to young adult books, which have great content but are a little shorter and easier to read than most of the adult selections. Two of the ones I have added to our library that I recommend are *The Lucky Ones* by Linda Williams Jackson and *Red, White, and Whole* by Rajani LaRocca. *Red, White, and Whole* is about a young girl, Reha, whose family has immigrated from India. She is trying to fit into two worlds, the culture of her parents' homeland and her new home in America. Her mother works in a lab testing blood, so Reha learns all about blood. Later, her mother is diagnosed with a blood disease. Through these experiences, Reha learns to be red, white, and whole. *The Lucky Ones* is about an eleven-year-old boy, Ellis Earl Brown, growing up in 1967 in Mississippi. He is inspired by the book *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* and great men like Thurgood Marshall and Robert Kennedy who he gets to meet on his southern 'poverty tour.' There is so much insight to be gained from these stories of young people.

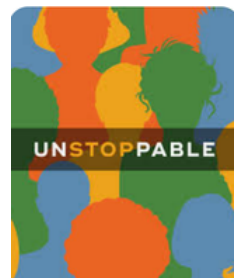
**Mission, Education,
